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He Shall Build An House

God speaking through the prophet Nathan to David said in 11 Sam. 7:12-13, "When thy days be fulfilled, and thou shalt sleep with thy fatners, I will set up thy seed after thee, which shall proceed out of thy bowels, and I will establish his kingdom. He shall build an house for my name and I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever". The fact that David's seed is to build a house may seem unimportant to some. However, we see that such is not the case when we learn of the importance that the Lord attached to it's construction.

Some may reach the immediate conclusion that he was referring to Soloman, David's seed, who was to build the temple. God refused to let David build the temple. Another glance at the prophecy quickly refutes the idea that it refers to Soloman, or the temple. God said, "I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever". Soloman's throne has perished with the passing of time. So has the temple.

By turning to I Tim. 3:15 we find what the pen of inspiration calls the house. "But if I tarry long, that thou mayest know how thou oughtest to behave thyself in the house of God, which is the church of the living God." The house then to be built was the church. Nathan said, "He shall build an house". It was to be built at some future date. Paul's statement to Timothy indicates that the house had been built. Somewhere between the time Nathan made his prophecy concerning the seed of

David, and Paul's statement to Timothy, the church had been established. The house had been built.

It is vitally important that we find out just when this wonderful event took place; for, there are those who teach, the false doctrine, that Christ will not establish his kingdom until He returns the second time. However, if we be lieve what Paul said, we can't help but accept the fact that it is already in existence.

Someone may be ready to object, by pointing out that Paul had reference to the church when he spoke of the "house of God"; and that the church (house) has nothing to do with the kingdom in the same sentence. Therefore, evidently they refer to the same thing. To further substantiate this fact, Nathan said in the sentence previous to the one just quoted, "I will establish his kingdom".

These facts cannot be denied. The kingdom amounts to the same thing as the church, or house. Nathan isn't the only one to advance this idea. Christ also advocated it. In Matt. 16:18-19 he said, "I will build my church and the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give unto thee the keys to the kingdom of heaven". Here the Lord uses the terms church and kingdom in the same sense. Adam Clark commenting on this passage says, "By the kingdom of Heaven, we may consider the true church, that house of God, to be meant; and by the keys, the power of admitting into that house".

From the foregoing we learn that David's seed was to build a house. Christ promised to build His church. We've established beyond doubt that the church or house is the same as the kingdom. But was Christ the seed of David referred to in the prophecy? If we can establish this point, and the time the house was built, the matter is forever sealed.

In Isa. 2:2-3, "It shall come to pass in the last days, that the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established in the top of the mountains and shall be exalted above the hills; and all nations shall flow unto it. And many people will go and say, Come ye, and let us go up to the mountains of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; and he will teach us his ways, and we will walk in his paths; for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the

Lord from Jerusalem". There are several factors about this amazing prediction that we need to notice. 1. The mountain of the Lord's house is to be established in the top of the mountains. 2. It would take place in the last days. 3. All nations would flow unto it. People would encourage others to go up to the Lord's house. 4. The word would go forth from Jerusalem.

The term mountain in this scripture is accepted by Bible scholars as referring to government. Therefore, the Lord's house was to be established in the last days, and it would be exalted above all human governments. The implication of it's originating point is un mistakable; it will begin in Jerusalem.

With these thoughts in mind, it would be well for you to read Daniel, the second chapter. There we find Daniel interpreting King Nebuchadnezzer's dream. The king forgot the dream. Daniel told him about the dream and what it meant. The image had a head of gold. The breast and arms were in silver. The belly and thighs of brass; and the legs of iron; with feet of iron mixed with clay.

Dan says in chapter 2:37-38, "Thou, O King, art a king of kings; thou art this head of gold". In verse 39 he continuues, "And after thee shall arise another kingdom inferior to thee, and another third kingdom of brass which shall bear rule over all the earth". Verse 40 tells us, "And the fourth kingdom shall be strong as iron". From ahese passages it is obvious that he has reference to kingdoms that would rule over the world. Subsequent history has proven this prophecy to be true. Nebuchadnezzer was the first, and is represented by the head of gold. the second kingdom began with Darius the Median as ruler. It was represented by the silver portion of the image. Alexander the Great was the third world ruled. (The brass). The fourth (legs of iron, etc.) kingdom was the Roman empire. Now let's notice Dan. 2:44, "In the days of these kings (Roman kings) shall the God of Heaven set up a kingdom, which shall never be destroyed . . . and it shall stand forever."

God revealed through Daniel in his making known to the king his dream, and what it meant, that He would set up a kingdom during the days of the Roman kings. It would never be destroyed. Daniel further put God's seal

on it when he said, "God hath made known to the king what shall come to pass hereafter; and the dream is certain, and the interpretation thereof sure". Dan. 2:45.

From scripture already quoted we learn that the kingdom will be set up during the last days. It would occur during the rule of Rome, the fourth world power. It was to begin in Jerusalem.

John the Baptist appears on the scene, as the forerunner of Christ, preaching "The kingdom of heaven is at hand". Christ begins His personal ministry. He also proclaims the kingdom as being at hand. In Matt: 16:18. He promises to build His church. Speaking of the kingdom He said in Mk. 9:1, "Verily I say unto you, that there be some of them that stand here, which snall not taste of death, till they see the kingdom of God come with power. The Lord here states that church, or kingdom, would be established during the lifetime of those standing near Him. It would come with power.

The purpose of heaven is fulfilled, and Christ dies on the cross. He is buried in a borrowed tomb. On the third day He arises. He appears to His disciples and teaches them concerning the coming kingdom. (A hint as to the nature of that kingdom is revealed in His remark to Pilate.) He said, "My kingdom is not of this world". He told the woman of Samaria, "But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth; for the Father seeketh such to worship him. God is a Spirit; and they that worship him, must worship Him in spirit and in truth". Jn. 4:23-24. He then ascended into Heaven, after telling the apostles to tarry in Jerusalem until endued with power from on high.

Acts 2 reveals that when the day of Pentecost was fully come, the apostles were altogether in one place. They were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to proclaim the message of salvation. Three thousand souls, upon hearing that message were convicted of guilt, cried out, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" They were told to "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins". Acts 2:37-38. Verse 47, "And the Lord added to the church

daily such as should be saved".

Thus the first Pentecost after the resurrection of Christ from the dead becomes the birthday of the cnurch. On that day the house was built. The church was established and the kingdom came with power. It is a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.

During his message to the people Peter states, "But this is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel; and it shall come to pass in the last days, sayeth God, I will pour out of my spirit upon all flesh . . ." Joel said it would happen in the last days and Peter said, "This is that". In Heb. 1:2, "Hath in these last days spoken unto us by his son". Isaiah said it would happen in the last days. So did Joel. Peter said that it did happen. Therefore, there can be no doubt' about it.

Jesus said that His Kingdom would begin before some people, then living, would taste death. This was literally fuifilled when the church was established. He further stated that the kingdom would come with power. In Acts 1:8, "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you". This was Christ speaking to the apostles. The Holy Ghost came upon them on the first Penetecost after Christ arose from the dead. They received power from on high, and began to witness for the Saviour. Thus, the kingdom came when the power came.

We have established the time element beyond doubt. The "house" was built in the "last days", during the rule of the Roman kings. It was to start in Jerusalem, and did. All subsequent events and facts concerning the kingdom as to time, place and circumstances agreed perfectly with the predictions that were made concerning it.

Was Christ the seed of David referred to in 11 Sam. 7:12-13? Let's see what Peter, being inspired of the Holy Spirit, said about it. Acts 2:29-32, "Men and brethren, let me freely speak to you of the patriarch David, that he is both dead and buried, and his sepuichre is with us unto this day. Therefore, being a prophet, and knowing that God had sworn with an oath to him, that of the fruit of his loins, according to the flesh, he would raise up Christ to sit on his throne; he seeing this before spake of the resurrection of Christ, that his soul was not left in hell, neither did

his flesh see corruption. This Jesus hath God raised up, whereof we are all witnesses".

This leaves no doubt about the matter. Christ was the seed spoken of in the prophecy. He promised to build his church. The church and the house are the same. It was to be built in Jerusalem; during the last days and during the rule of the Roman kings. The Bible teaches that it came to pass, just as God predicted. And who are we to question the wisdom of the Almighty? Let's accept the fact, and be glad that He made it possible for us to be members of it.

There Is Something In a Name

In our day we should strive to be nothing more or less than Christians. Would you not like to lay aside every human religious name and to glorify God through the name of His Son?
