To Show World's Fair Exhibit at Sedalia Fair

SEDALIA, MO. — Ray Mooney, minister of the 14th St. and Stewart Ave. church of Christ in Sedalia announced this week that churches of Christ throughout Missouri have arranged to move the entire church of Christ exhibit from the recent New York World's Fair to Sedalia for the Missouri State Fair August 20-28.

Mr. Mooney said that this is a cooperative enterprise by all congregations of that religious group throughout the state. He said that about 150 preachers, elders and other leaders of the church met in Sedalia on Saturday, May 21, to finalize plans for the exhibit and acquaint them with the project. There are about 480 congregations of the church of Christ in Missouri according to Mooney.

The church of Christ exhibit at the World's Fair was judged to be the most outstanding of its kind at the giant exposition. Occupying a 20 by 40 foot space with additional space for a "Little Theatre" that seats approximately 25 persons, the exhibit cost more that three quarters of a million dollars to build and maintain for the two years at New York. This cost was underwritten by churches of Christ throughout the entire United States. Mooney estimates the cost of moving the exhibit to Sedalia and maintaining it for the eight-day period there to be in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

Specially trained personnel will staff the exhibit at the Sedalia exposition. They are being selected and trained now under the supervision of Mr. Dewey Shaw, minister of the Brush Creek church of Christ, in Kansas City, Mo. Shaw

But while it has done that it has also made it possible for us to drive a long distance from the place of worship, and the time the average family has off over the weekend makes it possible to plan to go many places. While doing this the family does not enjoy the privilege of becoming an active part of any church of the Lord's people. They are taken here and there, worshipping one place and eating with grandma one Sunday and at another place while visiting aunt Susie the next. Of course they "have their membership" where they live but that is about all of their religion that is there. The

rest of it is gadding about in the "necessary convenience." People who thus live wonder why their children do not grow up to love the Lord.

Then take a look at another way in which we spend our extra time. Some people like to ride in a boat and today there are lakes all around everywhere. It is easy to slip off to the cabin Friday evening when the work day is over and spend the Lord's day on the water. If we do not do this we can rush to worship Sunday morning after spending the Bible study hour loading our boats, and run out to the lake Sunday afternoon. When I visit in the home of a shut-in I am always glad when I see that he has, and can enjoy, television. This is one of man's greatest accomplishments as far as entertainment and news are concerned. "Shenanigans"

For the information of some who have been misinformed, the Abilene Christian College Choralaires came to Mammoth Spring on April 1 to present a program of music in the church building. On that same afternoon they gave a program at the High School building in Thayer, Missouri. In that the program presented at the High School included certain secular numbers backed by a "classical guitar", the local newspapers reported that such was a part of their program, and it was (at the High School). Others have heard of their coming and have been greatly disturbed by what the paper said, even to the point of saying a good deal about what they thought took place. There was not a secular number presented in the church building, nor was there any playing on a "classical guitar" in the church building. All that has been said and written about that was to no avail and demonstrates the lack of knowledge and scruples of its authors.

The statements which have been made to criticize the church here, were made in ignorance, not only of what went on on April 1, but also of the Bible. Certainly, that which we do in worship must have Bible authority. But, there are some expedients which we use in carrying out these authorized things. One such expedient is a building owned by the church in which to worship. The building itself is not commanded. We could meet and worship and be scriptural in every way, and never own a building. Some selfstyled lawmakers have now come up with a set of rules which tell us what we can and can't do in this building that is merely an expedient to begin with. The Jews of Jesus' day were severly rebuked for making laws God did not make. "For they bind heavy burdens and grievous to be borne, and lay them on men's shoulders; but they themselves will not move them with one of their fingers." (Matt. 23: 4) I would like to see a list of the

rules concerning what we can and cannot do in a building where the church meets. Then, of course, I would expect scriptures in support of such rules. Can the preacher listen to the radio in his office at the church building? Is it proper to get a drink of water in the church building? What about using the toilets in the church building? Do we have to cease all conversation when we enter the "sanctuary" (that is the way denominationalists refer to it) and refrain from any "secular" things until we exit? Can any "secular" thing be done outdoors on the ground which was purchased "for a place of worship and teaching God's word"?

Brethren, don't be misled by false teachers who would make laws God did not make.

The Three Rules of Life

For many years man has referred to the three rules of life: The Iron Rule, the Silver Rule, and the Golden Rule. Possibly no example illustrates the working of all three rules more clearly than the story of the "Good Samaritan" as told by Jesus and recorded in Luke 10:25-37.

The thieves who stripped the man, wounded him, and departed were living by the Iron Rule: "might makes right". It is a way of life that is wholly selfish. It takes all it can with no thought for the welfare and rights of others. It does not lead to happiness, and those who follow this rule never know satisfaction from that which they obtain." For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and have pierced themsel ves through with many sorrows." (1 Tim. 6:10) Remember the words of our Lord: "Take heed and beware of covetousness; for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." (Lk. 12:15)

The Priest and the Levite were living by the Silver rule. "What you do not want others to do to you, do not unto them." This rule would forbid you doing harm to a man, but would never motivate you to do good to him. The Priest and Levite passed by on the other side, ignoring the man. They probably excused themselves by saying: "I didn't hurt him". In Matthew 25:31-46 we have the Lord's picture of the judgement and the terrible sentence passed against the many who have not rendered aid to their fellowman. Many today are living by the Silver Rule in that they would not steal and defraud - but they are too obsessed with their own personal affairs to render aid to others. Paul charged, "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially them of the household of faith." (Gal. 6:10) Condemnation rests upon us when we wilfully turn our faces from any good deed.

A despised Samaritan came by. Tho of another race, he lived by the Golden rule. This rule is clearly stated by Jesus in Luke 6:31: "As ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise." This rule will bring the utmost happiness now, and an eternal reward that will never pass away. "Let brotherly love continue. Be not forgetful to entertain strangers: for there by some have entertained angels unawar e s. " We cannot afford to pass up any opportunity for giving aid, for thereby we minister unto the Lord. This means that the saint must regard all he has as belonging to others when there is a need. We should never become so occupied with the cares of this world as to become blinded to the wonderful service we can render God and man by unselfish behavior. In this way the disciple walks in the step of the Master who went about doing good. (Acts 10:38) What better way can we show our discipleship?
