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The Immutable Laws of God

There are two natures of man: The "created nature," and the "Breathed-into nature." "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul." Gen. 2:7. God is the creator of our bodies and is the giver and Father of our spirits. The two natures blinded together, we call, "Life". In the course of time when these two natures separate, we call, "Death." "Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was: and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it," Eccl. 12:7

From these two statements, we as human beings, can conclude that we are citizens of two worlds. We are linked with the natural world no one will deny. To those who are thoughtful or concerned, are partakers of the divine nature.

For the government and control of man in this dual nature two systems are necessary. One system adopted to the material relationship; the other system to the spiritual relationship. The laws of nature and laws of the spirit are not antagonistic to each other but operate in different fields. "Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be." Rom. 8:7. The reverse of this is equally true.

Assuming that most people or at least a large portion believe in the existence of God and that he is the same God that gave and governs the natural things as well as the spiritual and is the author of the Bible, the book of revelation, the guide for mankind.

Since man is governed by two laws, one of nature and one of spiritual; these questions are posed for your study and consideration. Does God have greater consideration and greater respect for natural laws or those with reference to our eternal destiny? What part of man does God look upon with the greatest interest, that part created of the dust or that part which is akin to him? Is He more interested in the body which He framed than in the spirit He has given us?

These two laws are quite distinct: the one from the other, Nature and Spirit. In the natural world man does not need God nor does he deserve special help therefrom Man has learned to adjust himself to the laws of nature, as far as his ability and intelligence has let him progress. All the progress of our so called

civilization is only the discovery of God's spiritual law has not a thing to do with the material things of the earth, not that God could not have related them; He did not see fit in His infinate wisdom to do so. God could have answered thousands of questions that man has laboured years to find, but the Bible, the book of revelation, is to the part of man that is spiritual, eternal and that lives forever.

Concerning the natural laws, anyone that disregards and disrespects them always meets with defeat and no one has ever lived to prove and exception of this law

This is just as true in regard to the spiritual natures. Disregard of God's spiritual laws has universally brought defeat to those who violate it. This fact can be, and is, proven by God's word, from the first pair in the paradise of Eden sixty centuries or more ago down through to the present. Adam and Eve violated God's law and thus the penalty of death was passed. Cain did not worship God by Faith and Defeat, disgrace, and punishment resulted. Abraham and Sarah attempted their own "ways and means committee," to assist God in his plan for the child of promise but were defeated.

In the opposite, you can look from the first of the book of Genesis through the sixty-six books of the Bible and not one exception can be found where man has been condemned or punished, except in violation or disregard of God's law. No man has ever been blessed except as a result of obedience to God's law. His laws in the spiritual realm are just as dependable, reliable, and as absolute as they are in the physical world. Another thought on this line is that God's immutable law, both in Grace and Nature are fixed - like produces like - everything brings forth after it's own kind. God repeated this nine times in Gen. 1. And all those in the world who have labored so hard to refute this law has met with utter failure. Hear the wise man Soloman, "The man that turneth away his ear from hearing God's law, even that man's prayers shall be an abomination unto God." God is no respecter of persons (Acts 10:34-35) so all of His creation is subject to His laws. All life is circumscribed and bounded by law.

As God is the author of spiritual and eternal life, where did God locate it?

Surely, any honest person can understand from the above that dancing at the prom, etc., is sinful. However, many may not understand the above, so, the following viewpoint from the Bible is submitted.

1. A Christian is to "not do anything whereby thy brother stumbleth" (Rom. 14:21). Only Hell will manifest the influence of a dancing Christian.

2. A Christian is to "deny ungodliness and worldly lust" (Titus 2:12) Ungodliness and worldly lust are found in the dance.

3. A Christian is to "abstain from the very appearance of evil" (I Thess. 5:22). All that is connected with the dance is innately evil. "Evil companionships corrupt good morals" (I Cor. 15:33).

4. A Christian is to "Glorify God in his body" (I Cor. 6:20). The dance does not bring glory but shame to God.

5. A Christian is to "think on pure things" (Philp. 4:8). The dancer who can restrain his thoughts is made out of stone or is not psychologically responsible. This is extremely so for the male.

6. A Christian is not to engage in indecent bodily movements or unchaste handling of males and females. "Laseiviousness" (Gal. 5:19) is define as, "filthy words, indecent bodily movements, unchaste handling of males and females" (Thayer's Lexicon, p. 79).

7. A Christian committs sin to dance. "Revellings" (Gal. 5:21) is define as, "a jovial feast with music and dancing" (Liddel and Scott Greek Lexicon). Paul says, "they who practice such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God".

8. A Christian is not to committ "and such like" (Gal. 5:21a). If dancing, in explicit terms, is not condemned in the above terms, it certainly is condemned, implicitly, in these terms: "and such like."

Young people, Christians, it is not that this writer wants to hurt anyone by discouraging him from participating in the prom. The writer wants to keep youth from hurting him, others, Christ's church, God and youth themselves. The writer suggests that the parents of teenagers who plan to attend the prom have a first class party, invite dates and have a wonderful, wholesome time - a time that no one will ever regret, all for the kids. Parents HEED THE WARNING!! "If you don't want your teenagers hurt, then please do something constructive to help them." May God help his people to make the right decision.

God's Five Spiritual Laws To Become a Christian

LAW NO. 1

One must hear the word of God. (Rom. 10:17). One does not become a Christian because he achieves some sentimental feeling or merely has a desire to find God. Only the word of God is the seed of the Kingdom — the begetting power. God's way (law) to become a Christian does not vary from church to church, nor is it determined by the whims of man, but His revealed way is binding upon all who would become His children. (Acts 10:34, 35)

LAW NO. 2

You must believe in God and in Jesus as the Son of God. (Heb. 11:6; Acts 16:31). The existence of God may be reasoned by logic. (Hebrews 3:4). His power may be observed in nature. (Rom. 1:20). But He is revealed in the Scripture. The Bible written by the Holy Spirit, reveals Jesus and declares Him to be the Son of God. (1 Cor. 12:3). The same testimony of the Scripture which reveals Jesus reveals sin—its nature, its curse, and its cure. "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." (Rom. 3:22).

LAW NO. 3

You must repent of your sins. (Acts 2:38; Luke 13:3; Acts 17:30, etc.) The heart that loves God strives to hate sin, and in search of deliverance turns from his sin(s). A change life will follow the change of heart accomplished in repentance.

LAW NO. 4

You must confess your faith in Jesus. (Matt. 10:32; 1 John 4:15) This is a confession of life that accompanies the Christian the remainder of his life. It is initiated by a confession with the mouth to the Sonship and Lordship of Jesus. (Rom. 10:10; Acts 8:37).

LAW NO. 5

You must be baptized into Christ for the remission of sins. (Acts 2:38; Gal. 3:27; Eph. 1:3; 1 Peter 3:21). This baptism is a "burial" in water. (Romans 6:9) Inasmuch as it is the completing act of man's response to God's offer to be saved (Mk. 16:16), he who obeys it is saved and automatically added to God's church. (Romans 6:14; Acts 2:47).

These laws have no merit in and of themselves. They are meaningful only because of the grace of God and of the love and blood of Jesus. They are not works of merit, but a work of faith; not works of man, but a work of God. (Titus 3:5).

You and Today's Teenager

Teen agers are a fact of life. They are here to stay. They can be the most exasperating, disconcerning, frustrating, trying individuals on earth. But, they can also be the most wonderful, precious and loving persons at the same time. Rumor has it that even though they may not remember it, all parents used to be teen agers at one time!!

Today's so called "generation gap" is nothing new essentially. The gap, in one form or another, has always existed. Parents have always criticized the younger generation and the younger generation has always strained for recognition and self expression, to the exasperation and concern of their elders. There are a few things however in our own times that have accentuated the differences and have added to a new

element to the problem.

First, our young people today have more leisure time than most of us had when we were young. The excess of leisure hours is thus a detriment at times when not properly channeled to constructive purposes. An overabundance of physical energy and strong developing emotions must find an outlet: This is where the dangers and pitfalls begin to present themselves. But, let us keep in mind at all times the unalterable fact that this is not primarily the teen ager's fault!

Second, the average teen ager from the average middle class home today has a lot more money in his pocket than did the teen of yester years. Many of us used to have to work hard all week and struggle for a little change to be used for recreation on Saturday night. We grew up realizing that "money doesn't grow on trees" for if it had, we surely would have found it. The money didn't come easy and sometimes it didn't come at all. This is why some teens in this day and time are cynical about the "system". This is why some of them preach to us about being "materialistic". They never had to scratch for a dime and they don't savvy. But again, it is not primarily their fault.

In the third place, a moral revolution has been taking place in religious, educational and philosophical circles for many years that has as its basis the premise that man is no more than a highly educated and developed animal. As this "new" philosophy has grown it has permeated our society, infiltrated our schools and even had a strong influence on national leaders. Our entertainment media and advertising has sold out to the lust of the flesh and the baser emotions

of man. Uncleanness and sexual perversion is the order of the day. Permissiveness in every area goes unchallenged and unchecked. With a few years of this kind of teaching which encourages the renounciation and overthrow of established values, such as faith in God and belief of the Bible as His inspired word, it is no wonder that the threat of political revolution is the most popular idea going on many campuses. It is immoral to defend the freedom of South Viet Nam, but it is a highly moral act to employ violence and profanity in the disruption of our courts! It is wrong to invest one's capital and work for a fair profit but it is right to plan to blow up Washington, D.C. How far can such insanity go until it reaches the end point? And in the meantime, what effect is it having on our children who are exposed to its siren call day and night, week after week and month after month? If such had been the case in our own day, would we have fared any better?

In view of the terrible pressures exerted today upon our youth and the almost hostile environment about them, it would seem to this writer that we could take a new look at the situation and be a bit less critical and derogatory and somewhat more sympathetic understanding. Perhaps in our self righteous stance we are more rigid than we have right to be. Why can we not show a little compassion and attempt at least to "sit where they sit" and try to look at things through their eyes? We must, above all, try to set an example of sincerity before them and act like Christians that we profess to be so that they will desire to emulate our conduct and follow our advice so freely given. Let us not be small and mean and petty before them. If we expect our children to look up to us, then we must make sure that we stand tall so they can! May God bless us and ours.
