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## Place The Blame Where it Belongs

"Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God. Whosoever therefore resisteth the powers, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation." (Rom. 13:1-2)

Why has it become dangerous for people to walk our streets after dark? Or even in daylight hours, for that matter? And why is the crime wave among juveniles so alarming? Perhaps no one can formulate a perfect solution to these existing situations; but almost any one of us knows some of the contributing causes and can set about to make some changes for future generations.

We should consider first of all that behind every juvenile delinquent there are two adults. It is obvious that the juveniles are the objects of much criticism which should be directed at the adults. An utter disregard for the rights of other people and a disrespect for the law is the foundation for most crimes. If children are taught to respect the rights of others and to respect the law, they will rarely, if ever, be numbered among the juvenile delinquents. This teaching must begin in the home. When children are old enough to know it is wrong to disobey their parents, they are also old enough to be taught that it is wrong to disobey the law. And they should be warned that anyone who breaks the law is subject to punishment.

We are living in an age of push-button activities. Many fathers and mothers no longer have time to instruct their children in the basic rules of right living. They neither set the example nor teach the children the importance of right living. Their idea is to get out of the home and have a good time and hire a "baby sitter" to care for the children while they are running around indulging in sin. A beer-guzzling mother can hardly be expected to rear a Christian daughter. Neither can a whiskey-drinking, swearing father bring up a Christian son. The unfortunate children of such apostate parents will reap the results of their parents' evil living, maybe even behind prison bars.

A flagrant disregard for the law of the land is a disrespect for the law of God. How many times have children seen their parents flout the laws of the land by disobeying the traffic laws, cheating at

the cash register or on their income tax returns, etc.?

When our government legalizes strong drink and drugs, we might just as well expect a high rate of crime. It has been argued that as long as people are going to be found using the stuff anyway, the government might as well reap some taxes from the sale of it. But one thing we should keep in mind is that during the days of prohibition, although there was illegal use of whiskey, it was not flaunted before the younger generation every time they turned around. Neither did the fathers and mothers spend their evenings drinking in taverns while someone else, who was interested only in the money, cared for their children.

Jesus said, "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." Parents should teach their children to live honest, sober lives. They should teach their children that the world does not owe them anything, but that they are to live righteous lives, working with their hands to provide things honest for themselves and their families, and above all, that they are to honor God and keep his commandments. If all parents would adhere to the teaching of God, there would be no juvenile problems.

The blame must be laid directly at the door of the parents!

### The Devil, The Bible, and Man

The devil, the Bible, and man, these are three of the most challenging subjects one could choose. What does the Bible say about Satan? How does he work? What power may he exercise over man? What does the Bible say about recognizing error? Does it tell us how we can overcome Satan and does it tell us something about how he works?

In our fight against the powers of evil. there are some things we need to know about God. He created the heavens and the earth; he also created man. He therefore knows the most intricate workings of both. We must recognize the Bible as His unerring will for man, and that it has been confirmed by miracles and signs which show the eternal sovereignty and right of God over every being, in all places. God's moral code is unchanging. He is ever holy, faithful and just; keeps his promises, and is impartial in all things. God is forever merciful, and he providentially rules over all his works. In a special sense his mercy is shown to mankind, yet he is severe toward those who disobey.

As our Creator, God knows man fully and completely. He knows our weaknesses as well as our strengths, and will sustain us if we trust in him. It is imperative that all men know, however, that there is no appeal from his divine estimate of man. The Bible teaches that a curse abides upon those who choose their own way, and death awaits all who oppose God. God seeks the whole of man - body, soul, and spirit (Matt. 22:37). He does not seek so much what man has, but man himself. God gave his law, the holy scriptures, to govern man completely, and he expects us to know and understand what that will is (Eph. 5:17). Man must keep his place and not seek to usurp the authority of God, nor play at being God. The subjection and dedication God desires on the part of man is aptly described in the words of Paul, "It is no longer I that live, but Christ liveth in me." (Gal. 2:20)

In our fight against sin and Satan, it will be of tremendous help to see ourselves as we are, frightfully weak and dependent on God. In the garden of Eden man sinned by his own choice, yet his choice was not without influence. Gen. 3:1 says, "The serpent was more subtle than any beast of the field which God had made..." He tempted Eve through the only three avenues through which man can be tempted: The lust of the

flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life. Man failed the test. He sinned by disobeying God's positive divine law, "Of every tree of the garden thou mayest freely eat; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it; for in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die.' (Gen. 2:16-17) This was not an immoral act, but rather a setting aside of the authority of God - disobedience to a positive divine law. Men live immoral lives because they have rejected the authority of God and live by their own. Because man transgressed God's law in the beginning, sin, sickness, suffering, and death have been in the world. Man's greatest interest seems to be in fleshly, material things - the fleeting, vanishing things of the world. This is the influence Satan has over man. Only to the fleshly realm does the devil direct man's aims, thoughts, interests and purposes. Man's greatest need in relation to self is how he can overcome self and give all of self to God and serve his holy purposes.

Because of the devil and sin man's stay on earth is frightfully short. Because of sin we are constantly beset by pitfalls that endanger the soul. There is a widespread spirit of rebellion against God's spiritual law. And because this is true, men rebel against Civil law; against the authority of the home, the government and society itself. Men live in their own conceit, attempt to command life itself, and think there will never be a day of retribution for evil deeds committed. The devil takes advantage of our weaknesses: pride, foolishness and ignorance. Even in religion he seeks to destroy God's purpose in turning men from things divine. He is the father of sectarianism, a monument of human pride. Satan is the author of sin. Sin is unrighteousness and disobedience to God. And through sin he rules the hearts of men. Only the blood of Jesus can erase its horrid stains. In Isaiah 1:18 Isaiah wrote, "Come now, let us reason together, saith Jehovah: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool." But in verse 19, he said, "If ye be willing and obedient." Man's allegiance must be transferred from the devil to God if it be so. Jesus is our redeemer, and we are cleansed by his blood when we obey him. In Rom. 6:3-5 Paul shows this cleansing to take place when we by faith turn from sin and are baptized into Christ, where we are cleansed by his blood, and we are raised to walk in a newness of life.

To encourage you to turn to God in his divinely appointed way, let me suggest to you some sobering thoughts in relation to yourself. It is indeed sobering when we think that man's flight through time is so very swift. There was a time when I thought that some event predicted ten years in the future, "why that seems so far off!" but now, ten years seems such a short time. The Bible says, "We are but of yesterday and know nothing, because our days on earth are a shadow." (Job 8:9) "Man that is born of woman is of few days and full of trouble." (Job 14:1) The Bible further says man is "As the cloud is consumed and vanisheth away, so he that goeth down to Sheol shall come up no more. He shall return no more to his house, neither shall his place know him any more." (Job 7:9,10) This passage simply teaches that man shall know this earthly life no more once he has passed from it in death. He will know life after death, an eternal existence, either in heaven or hell. God has told us in his word that we are as dust, our days as grass, and the glory thereof as the flower thereof; the grass withereth and the flower falleth. It was James who asked, "For what is your life? it is even a vapor that appeareth for a little while, then vanisheth away." (James 4:14)

In view of the brevity of life and of Satan's desire to ensnare our souls, surely our thoughts can only turn to God. We may have our fun and high times here in sin, but is it worth the price that will be paid in eternity? We profess ourselves to be wise, but the Bible says, "The fear of the Lord is wisdom." God alone knows what is good for man in this life. With David we must pray, "Lord, make me to know mine end, the measure of my days, and how frail I am, that I may apply my heart to wisdom." (Psalm 39:4) There is so little time to prepare that we have not one moment in which we can afford to doubt the word of the Lord. If the Lord said it, it is sure; there can be no doubt. Jesus wants men to believe in him (John 8:24), to repent of their sins (Luke 13:3), to confess their faith in him (Matt. 10:32), and to be baptized for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). He then wants those who so obey to faithfully serve him unto death. Let's not allow "sin to reign in our mortal bodies", Rom. 6:12, but rather, "present ourselves unto God, as alive from the dead, and our members as instruments of righteousness unto God", Rom. 6:13. Satan's message is "Just believe, don't be baptized, just be

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## The Family Troubles of Abraham

The consequences of family troubles can be far reaching, troubling not only the lives of its immediate victims, but reaching over into the lives of future generations. One of the most far reaching examples in all history is that of Abraham. He lived about 3800 years ago. His descendants are still hating and killing one another with a vengence which has existed from their earliest existence. Their troubles are the concern of many nations and have cost the taxpayers of the United States billions of dollars, not to mention the danger of causing a global war.

In Genesis 16 - 21 we have a somewhat detailed explanation of how this all began. God had promised Abraham that through his seed all nations would be blessed. However, Sarah, Abraham's wife, was barren at this time, and they were greatly perplexed about how this promise could be carried out. This troubled them so much that it seems they attempted to help God out. Sarah proposes that Abraham take her maid servant, Hagar, and raise up children by her. The plan worked, but even before Ishmael was born, they regretted the action they had taken (Gen. 16:4). In due time, God lifted the laws of nature and Sarah bore Isaac, whose descendants became the Jewish nation, and through which the Messiah, Jesus Christ, would be born into the world.

With the birth of Isaac troubles really began. When Sarah saw Ishmael mocking Isaac, she requested that Abraham send both Hagar and Ishmael away. Though Abraham was reluctant to deal so severely, God instructed him to do this. God then promised Abraham that Ishmael would be the father of a nation of people (Gen. 21:13). Ishmael survived and married an Egyptian woman, and their descendants became a part of the Arab nations, which are still with us till this present day.

Isaac's descendants grew into a great nation of people after their release from captivity. After delivering them from Egypt, God delivered the land of Palestine into their hands, with the condition that they drive out the gentile nations inhabiting the land. With the exception of short periods of captivity, until Christ came, they looked down on all gentiles and in turn were despised by the Arabs. The Jewish nation ended at the destruction of Jerusalem by the

Roman general, Titus, in A.D. 70. After world war 2, a remnant of Jews returned to Palestine, and with the help of the United States, drove out the Arabs and set up a small nation which has renewed the bitterness and strife between Jew and Arab. To date the Jews have not accepted Christ. The apostle Paul, in Romans 10, 11, seems to hold out hope that the time would come when the Jew would accept Christ. Until this happens there doesn't seem to be any hope for the Jew to live in peace.

If only Sarah and Abraham could have trusted the Lord to take care of the problem rather than taking matters into their own hands all this trouble could have been avoided. In Isa. 55:8-9 God said, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord.
