Church at Winona Plans New Building

Hall, Perry Blue, and others whose names I do not have. They have baptized thousands of people and conducted a great number of gospel meetings. However, we believe that we have a group of young men from this county who will equal or exceed the great work of the above mentioned.

I would like to acquaint our readers with their names and where they are presently laboring. Charles Coil preaches for the church at West Memphis, Ark. He has held several meetings in recent years in this section. Eldon Coil is preaching regularly in the state of Indiana. Dovle Kinder of Sturkie has been in Freed-Hardeman College is now holding meetings in this area. Hillard Storey who has also lived at Sturkie is now in Italy. We find this statement in Heb. 6:19, "Which hope we have as an anchor of the soul, both sure and stedfast."

If the hope in Christ was removed, in this age of tension and uncertainty, the world would be plunged into chaos. Christ, and the hope H2 offers, is the only thing that man can truly count on. All else is uncertain. Our present way of life tends to create insecurity. Hence, everyone is busy trying to find something that will make life richer, and more majoyable.

This search for a better way of life has led many to investigate religion, with surprising results. They found something truly worthwhile. Their previous estimate of religion is reflected in their amazement that Christ has so much to offer. Many, before learning

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The Book of Acts

All but some of the most radical of Bible scholars agree that Luke was the author of Acts and also of the third gospel which bears his name. No evidence has been put forth as to who could have written the book if Luke was not the author. Irenaeus and other early writers credited the authorship to Luke without question. This helped build up a strong tradition in Lukes favor.

From statements made in chapters sixteen, twenty, twenty-one, and others, we can conclude that the author was a companion of Paul. From the salutations to the Colossians and Philemon, we learn that Luke was a companion to Paul while he was imprisoned at Rome. There is no doubt that the book was written by one man because of the similiarity of style and language throughout. The medical language in Acts and the writers interest in sickness and the sick suggest that the author was a physician. This is also noticeable in the book of Luke. The tendency of the writer to employ medical terms more frequently than the other writers and the way in which he abstains from using in a medical sense words which medical writers abstain from using must not be overlooked. He also uses medical language in a secondary sense and one must look very carefully at each word and phrase.

The book of Acts was called for by the need for an authentic history of the Apostolic period. It gives an account of what Jesus began both to do and to teach through the instrumentality of the Holy Spirit after he had returned to Heaven. Without this book man would have no authentic record of Apostolic history, except for fragmentary bits which are to be found in the epistles. The need for proof that the christian movement is one great movement for all peoples, both Jew and Gentile, needed to be driven home to not only the twelve apostles, but to the whole world then and in the ages to come. Prophets of old had spoken of the time when God would accept all men, and Christ had taught that in some of his parables. In the book of Acts we have Peter, a Jaw,

assisting Cornelius, a Gentile in becoming a Christian, and Paul, a Jew, preaching to the gentiles in main. The question of circumcision was settled in the council at Jerusalem as far as the word of God was concerned. Those who continued to insist on this act of the old Covenant did so in violation of the decision rendered in Acts, chapter fifteen.

We are entitled to the book of Acts for a history of the establishment of the church. The second chapter of Acts is one of the richest chapters of all the Bible. Here we learn of the church coming in to being and also how we can become a christian. Other conversions are recorded which make plain the plan of salvation. We learn how the New Testament church worshipped, Acts, chapter twenty, and what day christians assembled.

The labours of Paul in preaching the gospel to much of Europe and the middle eastern countries is recorded in chapters thirteen through the end of the book. We learn how christianity developed from a humble beginning in Jerusalem to its being made known to the greater part of the civilized world. From the work of Paul, christians should be encouraged to stand firm in the face of persecution and discouragement. The need for preaching the gospel to great and small is shown by Paul who preached Christ and him crucified to kings, governors, to business women, magicians to soldiers, sailors, and to servants in the very households of the great men of the Roman Empire. We today are much indebted to this inspired writing for what we know about the Church of Christ, in its early years here in this world.

Scholars are considerably disagreed as to when this book was written, some suggesting that it was written sometime during ninety to one hundred thirty A. D. This date seems to be founded upon poor judgement. Acts was written at a time when the supernatural manifestations of the Holy Spirit were taking place and were still regarded as significant.

Some would place the date at between seventy and eighty A. D. This opinion rests mainly on the idea that Luke was written after the destruction of Jeru-

salem, in seventy A. D.

Thiesses, and many other scholars, seem to be more logical, when they set the date around fifty nine to sixty two A. D. Much of their case rests on the belief that Luke wrote the book while attending Paul while he was a prisoner at Rome, awaiting trial. The abrupt ending of the book is thought to have been brought about because the book was completed before Paul came to trial. I believe this date is accepted by most today as being authentic.

Only three places are mentioned as possible sites for the writting of this book. They are Artioch, Ephesus, and Rome. The overwhelming evidence favors Rome. Tradition is that Luke completed his literary work while in Rome when Paul was a captive and awaiting trial for the disturbance that began back in Jerusualem.

That it was written from Rome is supported by the fact that the author is preoccupied, first with tracing the expansion of the church from Jerusalem to Rome, and second with stressing the favorite attitude of the Roman authorities to the first missionaries. While Paul was imprisoned at Rome, he was allowed the freedom of having visitors rather freely. This would enable Luke and others to be with him much of the time and would almost make ideal the conditions for prayer and meditation. What better time could Luke have had for writing the book of Acts.

They try to escape life by becoming absorbed in work, a career, or some other pursuit. Usually, they are selfish and self-centered, interested only in things that will further their interests. They refuse to look bayond the immediate confines to a better way of life. Alive among the dead is a good way to describe them. They are dead to hope, to Christ and all things that make life more noble.

Life without hope is a dreary pros-

pect. Without it man cannot arise above his animal nature. The principles of Christianity lift man to his highest peak. His conduct is based on higher ideals, rather than being motivated by selfishness. Man must have a goal in life, otherwise it becomes meaningless. Considering the heartaches and sufferings that are the lot of all, it would be tragic to think of the future as holding nothing better. True love is expressed in giving, rather than receiving. Divine love is a perfect example. God gave His Son. His Son gave His life. Why did they go to such extremes? Because they loved sin-sick, dejected humanity. They wanted him to have something better. Furthermore, they wanted him to know that whan all others had forsaken him he still had a friend. One that loved him unselfishly. One that could be counted on, when needed the most.

To attain the hope that Christ offers we must be in Him. If a ship is to avoid the storm, it must find a safe haven. Man's haven is in Christ. Just as the tender young plant must be nourished by the sunshine and rain, the babe in Christ must also be nourished. They are to "desire the sinceres milk of the word,, that ye may grow thereby." Proper growth and development depends on soil, climatic conditions, and other varying factors. Spiritual growth depends on environment, companionship, proper attitude, stedfastness, and reverence.

To maintain our hope in Christ, we must worship regularly. This includes attending all the services, and not just the ones that may be considered important. The new-born Christian is urged to, "set your affactions on things above, not on things on the earth." Worship should be approached reverently and sincerely. Regular observance of the Lord's Supper, prayer, singing, giving, and teaching, will provide proper nourishment and strength for the trials that lie ahead. Paul speaks of those who improperly approached the Lord's Supper. He said they were "weak and sickly." They endeavored to mix worldly things with spiritual. Their worship was vain. So will ours be, if we do not approach it with the proper attitude.

Our faith in Christ, and our hope for the future, will be severely tried. The arch enemy of all righteousness will do everything he possibly can to turn us from the better way. He will attack at the weakest point, using the cunningly devised weapons that are available to him. He knows our weakest point, and will not fail to work on it. Each time he is successfully resisted makes it easier the next time. But don't be deceived into thinking he will guit trying. Be on guard against surprise attacks. He may strike when you least expect it. His offers of worldly happiness are cunningly concealed in a bag of traps.

Our hope is an anchor that will enable us to ride out the storm of temptations, and enjoy the wonderful calm that comes afterward. Remember these words and live by them. "Thy words have I hid in my heart, that I might not sin against thee." Our hope in Christ will lead to a better life here on earth, but not only here, for all eternity too. The world's only hope for peace, happiness, and future blessings, lies in Christ. Do you have that hope? If not, why? You can have it!
