We have model cars, trains and planes. Also, we have men and women who model clothes. In the field of education we have teaching models. These models serve as an outline, guide and procedure for imparting knowledge.

Relative to teaching the Bible, I developed this model and found it to be effective in teaching and reasoning with people. This model is based upon the premise, WE CANNOT BELIEVE THAT WHICH WE HAVE NOT BEEN TAUGHT. Whatever our belief system is, we have been taught, have understood that teaching, and thus established our belief. We may have been taught error, have understood or misunderstood error or truth, yet the process was necessary for us to believe. In all learning, especially Christianity, it is imperative that we be taught the truth. (John 6:45, 8:32). Study the model.

TAUGHT

1. Truth 2. Error

UNDERSTOOD

1. Truth 2. Error

BELIEVE

1. Truth 2. Error Obedience -Faithful

Reflections on the Model.

We can be taught truth or error. Therefore, we understand truth or error. The result is our belief system. Example: One says, "I believe that sprinkling is scriptural baptism." I ask him why he believes this? He replies, "Because I was taught this, understood this, and therefore believed it."

In beginning the study, ask the student (person) what he believes about the subject you wish to teach him. This will be what he was taught and what he understood. Obtain the authority (Scripture, persons or Creed) for what he was taught. If he were taught error, then teach him the truth using the Scriptures. Reason with the student from what he believes to what he was taught and understood. Note the process relative to Satan and Eve in

the Garden of Eden. Satan taught Eve error. She understood and obeyed the error she was taught. (Gen. 3:1-7). (The greatest of lessons is, we must be taught truth, understand truth, obey truth, and be faithful to the truth to the saving of our souls eternally).

All of us developed our beliefs in this manner because we cannot learn by osmosis, neither are we taught directly by the Holy Spirit; therefore, someone had to teach us or we taught ourselves. The principle is the same as stated in the premise.

Do we believe what we have been taught and have understood? ". . . the devils also believe and tremble." (James 2:19). We must believe. (Mark 16:16; John 8:24). However, believing only or knowing only is not sufficient as this would be the same as the false doctrine of "Faith Only." Therefore, we must obey what we believe.

Finally, after obeying the truth we must continue to be faithful all the days of our lives. (Rev. 2:10).

This model is profoundly simple and simply profound. Try it, use it!

WHERE ARE THE HEADQUARTERS FOR THE CHURCH OF CHRIST

Though some may have their headquarters in Rome, Italy, Anderson, Indiana, or Salt Lake City, Utah, the Lord's church has no earthly headquarters. headquarters of a body institution is the place where the head resides and the place from whence orders or laws come to govern the subjects. Jesus is said to be the head of the church. "And he the head of the body, the church" (Col. 1:18). Also, "And hath put all things under his feet, and gave him to be head over all things to the church, which is his body" (Eph. 1:22-23). Christ, as head of the church, resides in heaven. Justification by Faith Only

When is one saved by faith? Is it when he believes or is it when his faith leads him to obey the word of God? Many honest and sincere souls firmly believe in justification by faith only. I do not question their sincerity, nor do I wish to reflect upon them in any way. My sole purpose is to present, for your earnest consideration, what the Word teaches on the subject of justification by faith.

First, let us notice how faith comes, The Bible teaches that faith comes by hearing the word of God "And when there had been much questioning, Peter rose up and said unto them, Brethren, ye know that a good while ago, God made choice among you that by my mouth the Gentiles should hear the word of the gospel and believe" (Acts 15:7-9). Faith came to the Gentiles by hearing the word of the gospel. "Crispus, the ruler of the Synagogue, believed in the Lord with all his house; and many of the Corinthians, hearing, believed, and were baptized." (Acts 18:8). The Corinthians heard before they believed. In John 17:20, Jesus said: "Neither for these only do I pray, but for them also that believe on me through their word." In John 20:30, 31, we read: "Many other signs, therefore, did Jesus in the presence of his disciples which are not written in this book: but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing ye may have life in his name." "So then faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the Word of God." (Rom. 10:17.)

When it comes to the question of justification by faith, the Bible clearly teaches that a man is saved by faith. What does the Bible teach as to when one is saved by faith? Is it by faith only, or is it when one's faith leads him to obey the will of God? In Romans 5:1, Paul said; "Being therefore, justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." He said "Justified by faith," but he did not say justified by "faith only". Jesus said in James 2:24, "Ye see that by works a man is justified, and not only by faith." This is the only place where the two words "faith" and "only" are used together with reference to salvation and here they are preceded by the word "not". The works to which James referred are not meritorious works, such as Paul had in

mind when he said "Not of works" in Ephesians 2:8, 9 speaking of the works of the Mosaic Law, James as the context shows, spoke of works of obedience. The passage which tells us that salvation is not by "works" about which one could boast refers to the works of the Law of Moses. This we see from Romans 3:27 "Where is boasting then? It is excluded. By what law; of works? Nay; but by the law of faith." The law of faith excludes boasting but does not exclude obedience. When Paul said in Ephesians 2:8, 9, "not of works", we know he did not mean not of obedience, because he said in Rom. 6:16, "Know ye not that to whom ye present yourselves as servants unto obedience, his servants ye are whom ye obey."

In order to further establish the fact that the Bible teaches that one is not justified by faith "only," I call your attention to the following:

- 1. If a man is saved by faith only, he is saved without the new birth. In John 1:12, we read: "But as many as received him, to them gave he the right to become children of God." From this we see that one may be a believer and not be a child of God. For the believer is given the right to become the child of God. This passage does not say that believers become the children of God, but that they are given the right to become the children of God. If one is saved the moment he believes, he is saved before he exercises his right to become a child of God, If then he is saved the moment he believes, he is saved before he becomes a child of God. If saved before he becomes a child of God, he is saved without the new birth, for one cannot be born anew without in the new birth becoming a child of God.
- 2. If one is saved by faith only, he is saved by an imperfect faith. "Was not Abraham our father justified by works, in that he offered up Isaac his son upon the alter? Thou seest that faith wrought with his works, and by works was faith made perfect." (Jas. 2:21,22). Faith must exist before it works. It must work before it is perfected. If one is saved by faith only, he is saved by an imperfect faith.
- 3. If one is saved by faith only, he is saved by dead faith. "For as the body apart from spirit is dead, even so faith apart from works is dead." (Jas. 2:26). Faith alone is faith apart from works, but faith apart from works is dead. Since it is

impossible to be saved by dead faith, it is impossible to be saved by faith alone.

- 4. If one can be saved by faith alone, he can be saved without confessing the name of Christ. "Nevertheless, even of the rulers many believed on him; but because of the Pharisees they did not confess it, lest they should be put out of the synagogue. For they loved the glory that is of men more than the glory that is of God." (John 12:42, 43). These rulers believed on Christ, but they would not confess it. Here we have faith without action. It was a dead faith, an imperfect faith, In order to be saved by faith, one must obey the word of God which is the source of faith. 'And a great company of the priests were obedient to the faith." (Acts 6:7). Also, in Romans 1:5 and 16:26, we read about the "obedience of faith," Then, if one can be saved by faith only, he can be saved without confessing Christ, Jesus teaches that this is impossible: "Every one therefore who shall confess me before men, him will I also confess before my Father who is in heaven. But whosoever shall deny me before men, him will I also deny before my Father who is in heaven." (Matt. 10:32,23).
- 5. The Bible teaches that faith only will not avail. "For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision availeth anything, nor uncircumcision, but faith working through love." (Gal. 5:6) Faith must exist before it works; it must work before it avails. It avails when it works. Thus we see that faith only will not avail, or save, as it must work before it avails.

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organization with an earthly head or bishop and other offices. However, the scriptures do speak of the local congregation being organized with elders (Acts 15:4), deacons (1 Tim. 3:8), evangelists (2 Tim. 4:5), and members (Rom. 12:4-5).

In arrangement of government, they rejected him.

HEAVEN IS REAL

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"And these shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into life eternal." (Matt. 25:46). Eternity is a long time to experience all the problems that only come occasionally here, but eternity is not long enough to know only that which is good. Eternal heaven is real, don't miss it.

All of us look for bargains when we shop. Well, heaven is the best bargain you will ever find. You could never do enough or endure enough to deserve to spend eternity there. It is only by the grace of God that anyone can have the hope of heaven. Heaven is a real bargain.

You can go to heaven! Paul knew he was going and he said that we can too, in II Tim. 4:7-8. Just think what a thrill to hear the Lord invite us in when he comes again. We need to get ready now, for heaven is real.

How to Become a Christian

The most important question ever asked is: "What must I do to be saved?" (Acts 16:30). Then, the HOW become equally as important. Notice the step by step process. First, we must have faith in the Author and Finisher of our faith, Jesus Christ. (Heb. 12:2). This faith comes by the hearing of the word of God. (Rom. 10:17). "But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." (Heb. 11:6). With the belief and trust that Jesus is the Redeemer, we must repent of sins. "And the times of this ignorance God winked at: but now commandeth all men every where to repent." (Acts 17:30). In repentance, we turn from sin, STOP serving Satan and START serving the Lord. (Matt 3:8, Luke 13: 3). With this new attitude we are ready to confess our faith, That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." (Rom. 10:9-10). Read Matthew 10:32-33. Acknowledging our faith, repentance and confession, the last step into Christ is baptism, "For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ." (Gal. 3:27). Read Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38. Now that our past sins have been forgiven, the Lord has added us to His church and we are Christians. (Acts 2:47: Acts 11:26).
