And when he does, he puts himself at cross purposes with the Word of God. We are told in James 4:17, "To him that knoweth to do good and doeth it not, to him it is sin." Hence, if these services do good, (And who can question that fact?) Many have obeyed the gospel on Sunday or Wednesday night. That certainly is good. Furthermore, erring children have been restored to their first love. That also is good. We must all be ready for them. The "One Service Brethren" are still apt to maintain, The Lord didn't say I have to be there on Wednesday night." We are further instructed to, "Be ready unto every good work." The Sunday and Wednesday night services are a good work. It's good to preach the gospel; to edify the saints in love; to bring up our children in the right way, by teaching them to honor the Lord at the appointed time; and many other things could be mentioned, but surely every discerning person can see that these services are a good work. The Danger Of Strong Drink

One of the greatest evils facing our nation today is the ever increasing number of people who portake of strong drink. The highways are littered with empty beer and whiskey containers. It steady stream of advertising is constantly before us in magazines and over the airways, extolling the virtues of this and that brand of whiskey or beer. The state of Oklahoma, one of the few remaining states which did not permit the sale of whiskey, recently voted, by an overwhelming majority, to permit the sale of intoxicants.

We cannot help but wonder why the citizens of our nation can place their stamp of approval on a thing which is condemned by the word of God, in piain and unmistakable terms. Paul said in 1 Cor. 6:10 that no drunkard shall innerit the kingdom of God. Yet we claim to be a Christian nation. Are we in reality becoming a nation of gluttons and winebibbers?

This writer can remember when the law forbid the sale of whiskey. True, there were some who patronized the moonshiner, but one seldom saw much drinking among teenagers and women. Today this is a common place in the activities of the very young. Many have become a slove to this soul destroying habit, before they become old enough to understand the terrible consequences of those who become alcholics.

In the 23 chapter of Proverbs we have a good description of one who drinks. Who hath woe, who hath sorrow, who hath contentions, who hath babblings, who hath redness of eyes? They that tarry at the wine" Hosea4:11. "Wine and new wine take away understanding." We feel very sorry for anyone who becomes mentally ill, which causes one to lose their power of understanding. Yet when he becomes drunken he is in fact, out of his head and in an insane condition.

A statistical survey of 200 new admissions to the penitentiary of the state of Washington shows that 94.5 were drinkers, and 47.5 were under the

influence of liquor when arrested. These same men were asked where they learned to drink. The replies showed that 20 per cent learned at home, 44 per cent at parties and dances, and 11 per cent in the armed forces. The remainder learned in various ways. These statistics point an accusing finger at cancing and parties as a pice where many start on the road to ruin.

The argument that if one drinks in moderation it is not sinful will not stand in the light of New Testament teachings. I Thessalonions 5:22 commands that we abstain from oll appearance of evil. Certainly drink comes under the heading of evil. Christians can not partake of string drink in any way and be consistent with the teaching of Christ, in Matt. 4:16; "Let your light so shine before men, thot they may see your good works, and glorify your Fathwhich is in neaven." No one can be a shining light and at the same time partake of string drink in any form, without destroying his influence for good. Also, one may take a drink occassionally thinking that they can reand the temptation to become a steady Grinker, and before they realize become a habitual drunkard. The best course to follow is to never take the first drink. It takes a much stronger will power to quit drinking than to say no to the first opportunity to take a drink. Remember the words of Solomon, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." Proverbs 20:1.

BAPTISM IS IMMERSION

The disciples were amazed and said, "Who then can be saved?" That same question confronts us today. Now we want to consider the different modern answers given to that question.

The Infidel answers, "None, all people are just the same. No heaven or hell."

David no doubt knew this when he stated in Ps. 14:1, The heavens declare his glory, and the firmaments his handiwork, the fool hath said in his heart, there is no God.

So we can see that no one except a fool would give an answer of that kind.

Another modern answer to the question by the Universalist would be; All will be saved since they teach universal salvation.

To show that this answer is untrue Jesus said, "Enter ye in at the strait gate, for wide is the gate, and broad is tne way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat; because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and new there be that find it." Mt. 7:13-14.

So we can see this answer is untrue because Mt. 7:13-14 shows many will be lost and that just a few saved.

The Moranst would answer, "All good people will be saved." Now let us see if this answer is in harmony with Goo's

word. Jesus stated, "Not every one that saith unto me Lord, Lord shall enter into the kingdom of heaven, but he that doeth the will of my father which is in heaven. Many will say to me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils? And in thy name done many wonderful works?' And then will I profess unto them, depart from me ye workers of iniquit, I never knew you." Mt. 7:21-23.

From these truths it is evident that morality isn't enough to save and that we must do His will.

Cornelius and his house is an approved example showing the absurdity of the Moralist's answer.

The **Denominationalist's** answer to this question would be rain only or that we are saved the very moment that we believe without any additional acts of obedience.

But James said thou believest there is one God, the devils also believe and tremble. James. 2:19. So if faith only is the right answer then devils have the assurance of being saved.

Furthermore they just had enough faith to make them tremble or be miserable.

To accept the doctrine of Faith only would just be enough to make a man miserable.

Hear James again in James 2:26, "For as the body without the spirit is deau, even so faith if it hath not works is dead being alone.

Again James stated, "Ye see how that by works a man is justified and not by faith only." James 2:24.

Now let us see what is God's will with reference to this question.

(1) Jesus provided for all. Heb. 2:9. (2- God wants all saved. Tit. 2:11,

2 Pet. 3:9, Rev. 22:17, 1 Tim. 2:4, Mk. 16:15-16.

Who can be saved? Notice the following examples.

- Unbelievers Jailer Acts 16.
 30-34.
- (2) Believers Pentecostians Acts 2:37-38
- (3) Penitent Believers Saul of Tarsus Acts 9 Act. 22:16.

When we examine these three conversions, we find they all did the same thing. Believed, repented, confessed and were baptized. The answer in each case

was given according to their need at that point in their obedience.

(4) Erring child of God can be saved. 1 Jno. 1:8, Acts 8:21, James 5:16 their condition of obedience in light of the scriptures are — Repentance, confession and prayer.

The Gospel of Christ is God's power to save for all. Mk. 16:15-16, Mt. 28:19-20 Lk. 24:46-47.

All will not be saved because some will not come to Christ. Jno. 5:40. But all that will come can be saved. Mt. 11:28-30.

The Gospel draws men to Christ, Jno. All that are saved will be saved by the Gospel. Rom. 1:16..

In conclusion in every example of New Testament Conversion as recorded in Acts of Apostles. They all heard, believed and obeyed the gospel without a single exception,

Pentecostians — Acts 2 Samaritians — Acts 8:4-12 Eunich — Acts 8:26-29 Saul — Acts 9, Acts 22 Cornelieus — Acts 10:1-48 Jailer — Acts. 16:30-34 Corinthians — Acts 18:8

Thus we have this question answered who then can be saved? by example as well as by precept. The answer by precept to this question, faith repentance, confession, baptism for remission of sins.

All then who meet those conditions can be saved from past sins, and saved eternally if they continue faithful unto death. Rev. 2:10, 1 Tim. 6:12
