PRAYER

There are two essential elements in the Christian living, A sense of obligation and a feeling of dependence. As a child of God we are obligated to study his word the Bible, II Timothy 2:15. And when we study his word that is God talking to us and as children of God we have the right to depend upon him. We also have the great privilege of talking to God through his son, Jesus Christ. We do this by praying. What a promise our God has made to us in (PS. 34:15) The eyes of Jehovah are toward the righteous, and his ears are open unto their cry," Also Matt. 7:7.

Ask, and it shall be given you; seek and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you.

The Hebrew writer in Heb. 4:16, says' let us therefore draw near with boldness unto the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy, and may find grace to help us in time of need."

From a study of God's word we can come to realize that there is an acceptable way to pray. "Saying our prayer's" is not necessarily praying, many times I am afra'd we make our prayers mere forms of words, cold and lifeless. Such prayers are no more than formalities.

One can draw nigh unto God with his mouth and honor him with his lips, while his heart is far from him.

For our prayers to be acceptable to God we must:

Desire (Rom. 10:1) we must also be in Reverence to him (Matt. 6:9). And Sincere asking in the name of Christ, (John 14:13 14).

Let us study one of the most touching

prayers in the book of God, it is found in Luke 23:32-34.

These precious words fell from our Lord's lips while he was dying on the cross "And there were also two other, malefactors, led with him to be put to death. And when they were come to the place, which is called Calvary, there they crucified him, and the malefactors, one on the right hand, and the other on the left, Then said Jesus, Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do.

Jesus died praying for his enemies. He practiced in his death what he preached in his life. At the very beginning of our Lord's ministry he taught his disciples to pray for their enemies. "But I say unto you, love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you." Matt. 5:44.

We know by certain events that Jesus did not mean by this prayer that he wanted God to save these sinners in their sin. But fifty-three days late; these sinners are given an opportunity to be saved. Acts 2. The prayer of Jesus is about to be answered.

The apostles and others are come together. For the first time after the death, burial, resurrection and ascension of Christ.

The gospel of Christ is being preached. Peter and the other apostles are preaching to the very one that had betrayed and murdered the son of God.

Peter told them that they had crucified Jesus the son of God, now when they heard this, they were pricked in their hearts, and cried out, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" Acts 2: 37). Hear the answer; Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sin, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost," Acts 2:38.

The prayer of Jesus is answered. The ones who crucified him are told what they must do to be saved. It is hard to imagine a preacher of our day not telling believing sinners the same thing to do to be saved, But very few preachers of our day will just give this simple answer to this simple question. But it is the only correct answer. Obedience

to this will bring salvation. Nothing else under God's sun will save a soul from death.

MAN IS SAVED BY HIS BELIEF, NOT BY BAPTISM

In answer to a question sent to Mr. Billy Graham, man is saved by his belief, not by baptism, is the way he heads his answer to the question sent him. (The question reads as follows: Nobody in our family has ever been baptized. Now that I have been converted. I want to, but my parents forbid me. What shall I do?) Mr. Graham answers; (As a Christian, you must always obey God rather than man. But God has told in His word that children should obey their parents.) I wonder where Mr. Graham learned in the word of God, that one becomes a christian without baptism. It is an impossibility for anyone to read in the word of God where any were ever recognized as a ch'ld of God or a christian in this dispensation of time that was not baptized. Mr. Graham considers the person who wrote the question to him a christian without baptism. But the Lord said, Mk. 16:16. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved. Mr. Graham says he that believeth and is not baptized is saved also. (He says, you must always obey God rather than man. But God has told in his word that children should obey their parents.) Now note you must obey God rather than man, would that include the parents as well as anyone else? If not why not? I wonder why Mr. Graham did not refer this person to the statement our Lord made in Matt 10:35-38 where the Lord said: For I am come to set a man at variance against his father, and the daughter against her mother and the daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law. And a man's foes shall be they of his own household. He that loveth father or mother more than me is not worthy of me. And he that loveth son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me. And he that taketh not his cross and followeth after me is not worthy of me. No one knows the reason why he did not refer this person to this statement better than Mr. Graham. For this passage says he, that oveth father or mother more than me is not worthy of me. He also knows the Lord said in Jno. 14:15. If ye love me, ye will keep my commandments. Baptism is one of the Lord's commandments

but, Mr. Graham tells this person to keep what the parents says instead of doing what the Lord said. The Lord said he that believeth and is baptized shall be sayed. Mk, 16:16.

Mr. Graham is also wrong in what he had to say about children obeying their parents. He left out the qualifying statement. Now take your Bible and turn to Eph. 6:1 and read. Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. Obedience of the children to the parents is in the Lord. Well how did the parents get in the Lord? Paul, will you answer that question for us? Yes, know ve not, that so many of us were baptized into Jesus Chirst were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death, that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. Rom. 6:3-4. Paul again answers in Gal. 3:27 For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ. How many Paul did you say had put on Christ? I said as many as no more nor less. No wonder Mr. Graham left out the last part of Eph. 6:1, for it shows the location of the parents. I believe God had something to say about th person who takes from what has been revealed in his word. Rev. 22:18-19, 2 Jno. 9-11. Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he hath both the Father and the son. The only one that has Christ is the one who abideth in the doctrine or teaching of Christ. Mr. Graham says you don't have to do what the doctrine says for you to do to have salvation.

Again Mr. Graham says, (The Lord knows your heart and your desire, and your desire to acknowledge Him in baptism is accepted when there are conditions that make the act impossible. The full responsibility is upon your parents in this matter.) It would be good for Mr. Graham to give us the passage that states where God has promised salvation outside of Christ. That he must do before such a statement as that can be accepted as being in harmony with the word of God. Now note he says. (The full responsibility is upon your parents in this matter.) Paul

what do you have to say about the matter? For it is written, as I live saith the Lord, every knee shall bow to me and every tongue shall confess to God. So then everyone of us shall give account of himself to God. Rom. 14:11-12. Obedience to our Lord my friends is an individual matter. I will have to give an account of my own sins. My parents can't answer for me, nor I for them, and to let my parents come between me and Christ is to love them more than my Lord. Christ said he that does so is not worthy of him. Matt. 10:36.

Therefore, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord.
