THESE THINGS COMMAND AND TEACH NO. II

In teaching others these things must be taught that Paul told Timothy to teach. If not, then the one who teaches other wise, cannot be a good minister of Jesus Christ, 1 Tim. 4:6. If any man teach otherwise, and consent not to wholesome words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ. and to the doctrine which is according to godliness; He is proud, knowing nothing but doting about questions and strifes of words, where of cometh envy, strife, railing, evil surmising, perverse disputing of men of corrupt minds, and destitute of the truth, supposings that gain is godliness: From such withdraw thyself, 1 Tim. 6: 3-5.

Here is what happens when one fails to observe these things. Paul said he knows nothing but strife railings etc. Not only is that true of an individual the same is also true of a congregation, when they fail to consent to the doctrine of Jesus Christ. There will be strife division and evil speaking as a result. Hence a faithful minister of Jesus Christ is to constantly warn the brethren against such evils that confront the church to day as Timothy was told in his day. I know the minister who does so will not be considered a ponular preacher. Often it is said of him that he is too hard when he reminds the brethren of those things. Yet brethron will say ves we are guilty of these things, but you are too hard or mean when you tell us about it. Those kind of brethren would not be pleased with Jesus Christ or his apostles. Peter said wherefore I will not be negligent to put you always in remembrance of these things, though ye know them, and be established in the present truth. Yea I think it meet as long as I am in this tabernacle to stir you up by putting you in remembrance.

The Bible tells us that sin is the transgress on of law, 1 John 3:4. The greater majority of sins c mmited by Christ'ans could be classified as sins of Commission. It is possible to commit s'n by thought by word and by deed. us that one with love in his heart as christians should have, thinketh no evil. Thus is it established that we can sin by our thoughts even though no one else may never know about them. That we can sin by words is well understood by all. The tongue which is the instrument which we speak is likened to a fire in James 3:5. Even so the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among our members, that it defilith the whole body, and setteth on fire the counsel of nature; and it is set on fire of Hell .Christians have to be careful of what they say and how they say it.

The other way that we may sin by commission is by the deeds that we may do. The deeds we do are testimonials of what our heart is thinking and have to be guarded in order that we do not transgress Gods law to abstain from the works of the flesh as recorded in Gal. 5:19-21. Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these; Adultery, forniciation, uncleanliness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions. heresies, envyings murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like: of the which I tell you before, as I have also told you in time past that they who do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God.

In James 4:17 we learn also that we can sin by omission. Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin. Whole congregations are often guilty of this type of sin. A do nothing policy on the part of able congregations is repulsive in the sight of God. Rev. 3:15, I know thy works, that thou are neither cold or hot. I would that thou were cold or hot. So then because that thou are lukewarm, and neither cold or hot, I will spue thee out of my mouth

- 4. How to become a member of any denomination. Does tell how to become a Christian. Baptized into one body. 1 Cor. 12:13.
 - 5. Where anyone was voted on.
- 6. A description of any denomination. How to begin one.

11 Pet. 3:18 "But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

This is the last admonition penned by the apostle Peter. We come into the grace of God when we are redeemed from sin, but once in that grace we may grow deeper and deeper in it, and indeed we ought to. Certianly our Lord is no respector of persons, but he is a respector of character and we by continued growth in him grow more and more into his favor.

Daily meditation upon the word of God, the great truths, and the characters revealed therein and an earnest endeavor to follow the examples of Jesus Christ our Shepherd in his association with people will cause us to grow in favor with God. THE COST OF DISCIPLESHIP

Marion Farley Dallas 17, Texas Luke 14:25-34

In the above passage Jesus made 't very clear and plain that a true disciple of His must put a great deal more valuation on Him and his teaching, than anything else in this world, even if need be, at the expense of human relations.

This fact is strongly emphasized in (Matt. 10:37) where he said, "He that loveth father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and he that loveth son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me."

We are made to realize what he meant when we hear someone say "the religion my father and mother lived and died by is good enough for me," or "if they didn't go to heaven I don't want to either," in effect this is equal to saving," I think more of their teaching, even if it was wrong than that of Christ," or, " I had rather be with them than with him," but will say this, if that is the desire of a person, he will allow you to be with them, even if their teaching was erroneous, but am sure the statement Jesus made to James and John, two of his apostles, who desired of him that they might sit, the one on his right hand and the other on his left in his kingdom, would apply to the one who would make such rash statements, he said, "Ye know not what ve ask."

The eternal destiny of the soul is involved in the decision we make. the more reason we have for knowing that every sacrifice we may be called upon to make, whether great or small in our own sight, is but a trifle considering the dividends it will pay, in this life, and in the life which is to come. On one occasion when asked by one of his apostles what they would receive for having left all and followed him, he told them that no one having done this for him would lose anything, he promised that such would receive an hundredfold in this life, and in the world to come, eternal life.

So often the husband or wife

will not become a Christian, because the peace of the home would be impaired, but ask yourself the question, wouldn't this be an awful price to pay for it?

It isn't anything unusual for these conditions to exist in homes, in fact Jesus predicted they would. He said children would be against the parents, daughter-in-law against the mother-in-law, husband against the wife, and there would be enemies in one's own house-hold.

It may cost you the friendship of some of the dearest of friends, and loved ones to be a real Christian, but the friendship of the one who gave his life's blood for you is worth so much more, you cannot afford to turn it down.

The apostle Paul should be a fine example to everyone on this subject. He was brought up a strict Pharisee, taught by one of their greatest teachers, lived accordingly every day but when he found he had been taught error, he renounced the religion of his fathers and associates, and we hear him as he says, "I conferred not with flesh and blood," that is concerning becoming a Christian, he didn't ask anyone what to do about it. Do you not have a great deal more admiration for him, than for the rich young ruler. who, "went away sorrowful," rather than obey our Lord?

Yes, the cost of discipleship as viewed by some is entirely too COSTLY, but when we consider the vastness of a never ending eternity, the joys of those who will be allowed to bask in the sunshine of God's love, and on the other hand, the horrors of a never ending Hell, no sacrifice, be it ever so great, should seem too hard

"BUT HE, WILLING TO JUSTIFY HIMSELF, SAID"

Luke 10: 29

These words are the writer's comment about the lawyer who was told by Jesus to love his neighbor as himself He was not willing to obey his Lord but he wanted to escape condemnation He found some excuse for his actions

Justification is a great Bible subject. If God has justified us, then we are saved. Only the justified will walk the streets of gold the scriptures make it quite clear, however, that God— and only God can justify "It is God that justifieth." Romans 8:33. Justification, if it comes from God, is worth more than all of earth's treasures but please answer me this: "What is so" justification worth?"

"Every way of a man is right in his own eyes" Prov. 21:2. No matter what a man wants to do, whether it be adultery or stealing or lying, if he wants to do it badly enough, he can somehow find some way to justify his conduct. This certainly would not mean that God justifies men who commit such abominable acts. Paul once said: "I know nothing against myself, yet am I not hereby justified, for He that judgeth me is the Lord" 1 Corinthians 4:4.

You may have never obeyed the Gospel and yet you are using some puny excuse that you feel justifies you. You may be giving but a fraction of what belongs to God but you feel that you can justify your actions. Many spend precious little time studying their Bible or working for the Lord but when you ask them about their neglect they offer excuse after excuse to justif- themselves. Do you really believe you are justified in the sight of God? What if you do just-ify yourself here but stand condemned in the day of judgment? It requires but little effort to justify ourselves; (and anvone can do it) but it is worth even less. Think on these things.
