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Spending Our Years

If you were to go to Egypt today, you might see what Moses himself might have seen centuries ago . . . a crowd of people surrounding a story teller. This is one of the customs of the East. The story tellers are more often found in those places where there are many illiterate and few books. Only a few incidents in the story will stand out in the memories of the listeners. But the stories are often so fascinating that one senses disappointment when the story is done. Moses wrote, "We spend our years as a tale that is told" (Ps. 90:9). Years are spent so very quickly. The story of one's life is filled with amusing events, solemn occasions, beautiful memories. But, like any good book that is read, it seems to go by so fast. Concerning the spending of our years, Moses, in the oldest psalm and one of the oldest poems in the world, wrote of four important facts that we should remember.

I. REMEMBER THE BREVITY OF LIFE

Moses wrote, "The days of our years are threescore and ten" (Ps. 90:10). In his day life had come to be very much the same in duration as it is with us. But eighty years is brevity itself compred with those who lived in the beginning of time. Adam lived nine hundred and thirty years. Those who lived before the flood lived an average of seven to eight hundred years. But after the flood, atmospheric conditions changed, the waters of the atmospheric canopy had fallen allowing much more of the sun's ultraviolet rays to reach earth causing men to age much more quickly. Abraham lived only one hundred and seventy five years and by the time of Moses. seventy was average. While seventy or eighty is brevity itself compared with nine hundred and thirty or nine hundred and sixty nine years, it is nothing when contrasted with eternity.

The brevity of life is a truth which everybody believes and yet how many of us act as if we believe it! We are conscious of the precariousness of other people's lives but we persuade ourselves that our time is not quite so limited as theirs. "All men think all men mortal but themselves." David wrote, "Lord, make me to know mine end, and the measure of my days, what it is; that I may know how frail I am" (Ps. 39:4). How we need to be reminded of that!

II. REMEMBER THAT ONE DAY WE SHALL ALL FLY AWAY

"And if by reason of strength they be fourscore years, yet is their strength labour and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away" (Ps. 90:10). At death man flies away from this earth to realms unknown as yet, those realms of which the Word only gives us a glimpse. Man flies away, his soul takes leave of his body just as in the case of Rachel. "And it came to pass, as her soul was in departing, (for she died) that she called his name Benoni: but his father called him Benjamin" (Gen. 35:18). It is only the body that is entombed. The spirit goes to Sheol (O.T.) or Hades (N.T.) to await judgment on that final day. The wicked soul will anguish in torment; the righteous soul will be comforted in Abraham's bosom (Lk. 16). How important it is that we live faithfully as Christians so that we will fly away into the Lord's care and keeping when death

III. REMEMBER THE WRATH OF GOD

"Who knoweth the power of thine anger? even according to thy fear, so is thy wrath" (Ps. 90:11). Moses saw men dying all around him. He lived among funerals. He saw visible evidence of the wrath of God (1 Cor. 10:5-11).

What the power of God's anger is in hell and what it would be on earth now if it were not in mercy restrained, no man living can conceive. It boggles the mind and staggers the imagination. What man is there who fears God as He ought to be feared? What man is as afraid of sin as he ought to be? Should we not straighten up ourselves, our lives, in view of the wrath of God? Who knoweth the power of His anger? Is it not as unspeakable to us as the love of Christ which passeth knowledge?

IV. REMEMBER TO NUMBER YOUR DAYS

Someone has said that this rule of arithmetic is the hardest. "So teach us to number our days, so that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom" (Ps. 90:12). Of course, we have no idea when our life will end but the idea here is to recognize that our days here are numbered and to make them count!!!

Thomas Edison said, "Time is the most important thing in the world." Yet, how often do we waste time. How often do we hear expressions such as marking time, passing the time of day, or killing time? Benjamin Franklin said, "Dost thou love life? Then do not squander time, for that is the stuff that life is made of." Oh how we waste precious time!

Our Lord has only a brief time on this earth, just thirty-three years and only three years of that time to finish His work. But look at how He took advantage of his opportunities and numbered his days wisely.

As 1989 draws to a close, let us all remember the brevity of life, that one day we shall fly away, the wrath of God, and to number our days. Let us redeem the time in eighty-nine!

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I Have Finished (Part 3)

The two previous installments of this article have served to address the tenet of premillennialism from the aspects of: 1) A literal return of Jesus to earth to establish his kingdom (which the Bible denies). and 2) The establishment of his kingdom in the first century A.D. following his resurrection (which the Bible affirms). Jesus himself in his prayer recorded in John 17 said, "I HAVE FINISHED the work which thou gavest me to do" (vs. 4). Either: 1) Jesus was correct and has thus "finished" that work; or, 2) He was mistaken about its being "finished"; or, 3) He deliberately misled his followers by stating that he had "finished" his task when, in actuality. he had not. Of course, only the first of these choices is correct and thus substantiated by the remainder of the Bible. Based on Jesus' affirmation in John 17, it shall be the objective of this article to address the topic of the Abrahamic promises.

Beginning in the twelfth chapter of Genesis, the Bible records a series of three distinct promises to Abraham, the father of the Jews. God promised: 1) That through Abraham's seed a great nation would be made; 2) That they (that nation) would receive a land distinctly theirs; and, 3) That through his (Abraham's) seed all earthly nations would be blessed. The remainder of God's word is devoted to the fulfillment of these prophecies and the concerns for the eternal world to come.

The first of these promises concerned the nation of Israel itself. The second involved the land of Canaan, "the land flowing with milk and honey" (Ex. 3:8). The third was spiritual, involving the coming of Jesus (the seed of Abraham - Mt. 1: 1-16), through whom all nations would be blessed. The system of premillennialism affirms that immediately following the second coming of Christ there will be a literal period of 1,000 years in which Jesus will reign on the literal throne of David in the literal city of Jerusalem. Also at his second coming, the Jews are to be returned to Palestine, at which time all the "kingdom prophecies" will be fulfilled. Thus, if it can be shown that all these Abrahamic promises have been fulfilled already, then another of the foundational premises of premillennialism falls, as does the system itself.

Notice, first, the national promise of Israel made by God to Abraham. God said: "And I will make of thee a great nation" (Gen. 12:2); "Look now toward heaven, and tell the stars, if thou be able to number them: and he said unto him, So shall thy seed be" (Gen 15:5); "And I will make thy seed as the dust of the earth" (Gen. 13:16). Although some twenty-five years passed between the promise and the birth of Isaac, the son of promise, and some 430 years between the promise and its actual fulfillment, through the providential care of God the nation of Israel stood at the foot of Mt. Sinai to be pronounced "a holy nation" (Ex. 19:6). Therefore, this "holy nation" was the fulfillment of the promise and the prophecy made to Abraham.

The second of these promises, the land promise, has also been fulfilled. In Genesis 13:15 the Lord said, "For all the land which thou seest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed for ever." Likewise, Genesis 15:18 reveals that "the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, Unto thy seed have I given this land, from the river of Egypt unto the great river. the river Euphrates." The general contention of premillennialism is that this land promise has never been fulfilled and, therefore, must be in "the millennium." However, after the nation had wandered for some forty years in the wilderness, they were led by Joshua into the promised land. Near the close of his life, Joshua made the following statement concerning Israel:

"And, behold, this day I am going the way of all the earth: and ye know in all your hearts and in all your souls, that NOT ONE THING HATH FAILED of all the good things which the Lord your God spake concerning you: ALL ARE COME TO PASS unto you, and NOT ONE THING HATH FAILED thereof. Therefore it shall come to pass, that as ALL good things are come upon you, WHICH the Lord your God PROMISED YOU; so shall the Lord bring upon you all evil things, until he have destroyed you FROM OFF THIS GOOD LAND which the Lord your God HATH GIVEN YOU, When ye have transgressed the covenant of the Lord your God, which he commanded you, and have gone and served other gods, and bowed yourselves to them; then shall the anger of the Lord be kindled against you. and ye shall perish quickly from off the GOOD LAND WHICH HE HATH GIVEN UNTO YOU" (Josh. 23:14-

Twice Joshua affirmed that the land was a part of God's promises to them. He also revealed that there was not a single incident among these promises (including the land promise) that had failed. But, he was quick to iterate that ALL had come to pass. Notice, however, that their continued occupancy of the land was conditioned upon their continued faithfulness to God.

As a further revelation of the land promise having been fulfilled, notice the words of I Kings 4:21: "And Solomon reigned over all kingdoms from the river [Euphrates] unto the land of the Philistines, and unto the border of Egypt." Hence, the territory over which Solomon reigned had the exact dimensions of the territory promised to the seed of Abraham (Gen. 15:18). The land promise made to Abraham does not, therefore, wait for a future fulfillment. It has already occurred. Through their disobedience, however, the Jews broke the covenant and forfeited their rights to the promises (Dt. 30:17-20).

The third promise made to Abraham was spiritual in nature. Through the lineage of Abraham all nations of the earth were to be blessed (Gen. 12:3). In Acts 3: 25, 26 the following observation was made by Peter:

"Ye are the children of the prophets, and of THE COVENANT WHICH GOD MADE with our fathers, SAY-ING UNTO ABRAHAM, AND IN THEE SHALL ALL THE KINDREDS OF THE EARTH BE BLESSED. Unto YOU first God, having raised up his Son Jesus, SENT HIM TO BLESS YOU, in turning away every one of you from his iniquities".

There it is, then. The blessing to all nations is the "turning away" of "iniquities", and is found only in Christ, the seed of Abraham. Paul stated it thus: "If ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed and heirs according to the promise" (Gal. 3: 29). There is no denying that Christ is that promised seed (Gal. 3:16) and that the promised blessing to all nations is "all spiritual blessing in heavenly places" (Eph. 1:3). Truly, then, did Jesus say, "I have finished the work which thou gavest me to do" (Jn. 17:4).

IF ONE IS SAVED BEFORE BAPTISM

- 1. He is saved before his sins are remitted. "Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38).
- 2. He is saved before his sins are washed away. "And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16).
- 3. He is saved before he is born again. (John 3:5). "Jesus answered, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, except a man be born of the water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God."
- 4. He is saved outside of Christ. (Romans 6:4). "Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life."
- 5. He is saved before he is saved! (I Peter 3:21). "The like figure whereunto even baptism doth also now save us (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God), by the resurrection of Jesus Christ."
- 6. He is saved sooner than the Lord said he would be. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned" (Mark 16:16).
- As Noah and his house were saved through God's grace, by water (I Pet. 3: 20), and as the Israelites were, by the power of God, delivered from the Egyptians by being baptized in the Red Sea (I Cor. 10:1-3) so we are saved by the grace of God when we are baptized. (Titus 3:5).
