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# Has God Asked Too Much?

When Solomon died his son, Rehoboam, began to reign as king over Israel but because of a heavy hand of oppression ten of the twelve tribes rebelled against him and made Jeroboam their king. All men of Israel were to return to Jerusalem three times each year for certain feasts and Jeroboam reasoned that if they continued to do so their hearts would be turned back to Jerusalem and Rehoboam so he made two calves of gold and placed one in Bethel and one in Dan and said to the people, "It is too much for you to go up to Jerusalem: behold thy gods, O Israel, which brought thee up out of the land of Egypy." (I Kings 12:28). Jeroboam thought to streamline their religion and make it more convenient the people would continue to follow him. Does this have a familiar ring to it? How many religions today are built largely upon "convenience" instead of "conviction"? A way of convenience or conviction, which? Jeroboam was interested in providing convenience rather than conviction in the people. God said, go to Jerusalem to worship. Jeroboam said, God is just asking too much; but who was he to change God's arrangement, laws or commandment? And what man has that right today? Paul said, "Nav but, O man, who art thou that repliest against God? Shall the thing formed say to him that formed it, why hast thou made me thus? (Rom. 9:20). If religion by convenience rather than conviction was wrong then, is it not wrong today? Do we not have a lot of "Jeroboams" in religious leadership today?

Has God ask too much in asking that we walk by faith? Most people seemingly are not satisfied unless they can "see" something or "feel" something but Paul said, "We walk by faith and not by sight" (2 Cor. 5:7). And that "Faith comes by hearing the word of God" (Rom. 10:17). As we study the various examples of conversion recorded in Acts we find it was what people "heard" that brought them to obedience. For example:In (Acts 2:37) it was when the people "heard" the preach-

ing of the apostles that they were pricked in their hearts. Philip preached Jesus to the Ethiopian and when he "heard" Philip's preaching he said, "See, here is water; what doth hinder me to be baptized?" (Acts 8:35-39). Cornelius was told to send to Joppa for Simon Peter who would "tell him words" whereby he and his house might be saved (Acts 11:13-14). "Many of the Corinthians hearing (Paul's preaching) believed, and were baptized" (Acts 18:8).

Is God asking too much when He asks us to repent of all our sins? He said "Repent or perish" (Luke 13:3, 5). Through Paul He "Commanded all men everywhere to repent" (Acts 17:30). God has given us the meaning of repentance, the means of repenting, the opportunity, inducement and promise of forgiveness, but the repenting is up to us.

Has God asked too much in asking the penitent believer to be baptized in order to be saved? Please read, (Mark 16:15-16; Matt. 28:18-20; Acts 2:38; Acts 10:48; Acts 22:16; Rom. 6:3-6; Gal. 3:26-27; 1 Pet. 3:21).

Does God ask too much when He asks us to worship and serve him according to "his will" and not ours? (Matt. 15:9; Acts 17:23; John 4:24). Does he ask too much by asking our complete obedience? (Matt. 7:21; Heb. 5:8-9; Rev. 22:14). Surely in view of what God has done for us by providing the necessities and luxuries of life, and much more, salvation through Christ, we could not say that God is asking too much of us.

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# What God Could Have Done, And What God Did

Many individuals enter into a study of the Bible with the idea that it cannot be understood by all alike. Since, according to this thought, that is the case, it does not really matter what one obtains from the Bible or how he "interprets" it. All that matters is that he obtain something and that he does interpret it somehow. Such a thought is repugnant to God's justice, discrediting to his inspired word, damning to one's soul and further fuel for the fires of infidelity. Not only can the Bible say the same thing to all, but it must do so in order for it to be God's word (I Cor. 14:33). Not only can it be seen by all alike, but it must be; or else it misinterpreted. The ideas of "agreeing to disagree" and "I'm O.K., you're O.K." as far as spiritual matters are concerned are masquerades of Satan that have originated in the halls of Hell.

One idea that contributes greatly to much misunderstanding is the thought that says, "This is what God can do; therefore, this is what God does." When this supposition is seen in the light of Bible teaching, the fallacy of it becomes clear. Several prevailing schools of thought in the religious world rest upon this invalid notion.

The dogma of Universalism has its foundation in this very proposition. The prevailing thought that God is too loving and too kind to allow anyone to be lost is the emotional appeal of this infidelic system. The reasoning behind it is that God is powerful enough to save all, that he

loves everyone, and that he would not have any to be lost. All of these, of course, are true. Thus, the reasoning is that since God possesses the power to do this that this is what he will actually do. When one allows emotion and desire to overcome reason and truth, he can so deceive himself into thinking this to be true. While it is true that God could have created man with the absence of "his (God's) own image" (Gen. 1:27), that he had the power to deny man the freedom of choice (Josh. 24:15), that he possessed the wherewithal to make man a "robotic" being that could do naught but the will of God, the question is not "what could God have done?", but "What did God actually do?" God has the power to create this world anew and destroy it a thousand times over. But, he is not doing so. Although God possessed the power to pronounce Universalism as a fact, the Bible reveals that he did not do so (Mt. 7:21-23).

The precept of Unconditional Election is another plant with its roots seated in this idea. The proponents of this obedience-denying, Bible-rejecting doctrine have thus "reasoned" that since God has the power to save unconditionally this must then be what he did. The fallacy of such thinking is again evident. Truly, God possessed the awesome power to pronounce salvation to whomever he desired and by whatever means he desired. However, the question is not what God could have done, but rather what God actually did. Such passages as Mark 16:16, Acts 2: 38 and Hebrews 5:8,9 reveal the decision he rendered. The Lord made faithful obedience a prerequisite to the joys of the heavenly abode. Neither by this nor any other idea can man misalign and negate this Biblical truth.

The tenet of "Once saved, always saved" also springs from the thought currently under consideration. Numerous are the times when denominationalists in debate have charged the members of the body of Christ with denying God's power by insinuating that if one falls it is the fault of God. But, notice again, that the question is not one of God's ability, but of his choice. Of course God possessed the power to pronounce that once an individual is "saved" he would never fall away. Just as in creation, God could have denied man free moral agency upon his becoming a Christian. He could have taken "the image of God" (which allows for choice) away from him at that point. However, what he had the power to do is not what he actually did. He left man with the same freedom of choice after conversion that he had before conversion. Therefore, man can choose to abandon God and turn back to the world (Mt. 13: 22; II Pet. 2:20-22; I Tim. 1:19,20).

Further, the precept of "faith only" has its basis in this idea. Since a few passages mention faith as being essential to the salvation of one's soul, many suppose that since God had the ability to pronounce salvation at the point of faith alone without any further acts of obedience, that this is exactly what he did. Once again, however, the question is one of action instead of ability. Even though God had the ability to establish the system of "faith only", he did not exercise that power (Jas. 2:14-26). Rather, he chose to base man's salvation upon obedience to his word (Heb. 5:8,9). What he actually did was much different from what he could have done.

Many more are the insidious doctrines of man that spring from such a thought as this. The power of God is truly an awesome thing. No man can limit that power. However, God has the ability to limit his own power. Whenever he does so, man must adhere to the limitations thus imposed by God and restrain emotion and desire from overcoming truth and reason. The only means of knowing the will of God is, of course, through his revealed word. When it alone is considered without preconceived ideas, unrestrained emotional appeal and selfish desires, not only can one know much about what God had the power to do, but also what God has actually done. ## **Neglecting The Bible**

On national television quiz shows the simplest Bible questions are usually missed. Many are neglecting and forgetting the Bible. Are members of the Lord's church being influenced? (Rom. 10:1-3) He recognized their zeal for God but it was not according to knowledge. He stated clearly the results of this ignorance, "For they being ignorant of God's righteousness and going about to establish their own righteousness have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God." Is this not exactly what is happening to many today? They do not know what is right and have neglected to learn so they do what they feel and believe is right. They have developed their own set of rules for what is right and wrong. They are failing miserably but they will not know, unless they are taught, until it is too late in the day of judgment. (See Acts 8:30, 31 and Matt. 7:21-23.) They never knew or failed to heed the warning of Jeremiah, "O Lord, I know that the way of man is not in himself; it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps." (Jer. 10:23.)

There is no escape for those who neglect the Bible. The writer of the book of Hebrews raised the question but did not answer it because he had already done so. He wrote, "How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation; which at the first began to be spoken by the Lord, and was confirmed unto us by them that heard him?" (Heb. 2:3.) He did not give an answer because he had already said, "We ought to give the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard, lest at any time we should let them slip." Many are not only failing to give "the more earnest heed," they are giving little or no heed. They continue to let them slip. God requires all such to repent. "In the past God overlooked such ignorance, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent." (Acts 17:30 NIV.) In some places, enough Bible has been preached to save everyone if all would pay careful attention and would not drift.

The seriousness of neglecting and forgetting the Bible is plainly set forth in Psalm 50. The wicked "hated instruction" and cast God's words behind them. They gave their mouths to evil and their tongues framed deceit. They sat and spoke against their brothers and slandered their own mother's son. God said because he kept silence they thought he was like them. But God answered that he would rebuke them and lay the charge before them. He warn, "Now consider this, ye that forget God, lest I tear you in pieces, and there be none to deliver." (v.22.)

Could you be encouraged to cease being a forgetful hearer and become a doer of the work and you will be blessed in your deed? (Jas. 1:25.) Please do not take the present silence of God to mean that you have gotten by and that you will not have to give an account unto him. "So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God." (Rom. 14:12.)
