"Tho he slay me; Yet will I trust in Him" — When Job made this statement, I am of the opinion that he referred to physical death. It should be also in our hearts even to that spiritual death that will be meted out to untold millions on that Great Day. When one becomes a Child of God they do not attain eternal life at that time except in the sense that they remain entirely faithful throughout the rest of their lives.

Paul, a specially called Apostle, who spent about thirty years laboring for the cause of Christ, in his inspired writings tells us of the constant warfare that is waged in our bodies, (Romans 7 and 8) and in 1 Cor. 9:27 he stated the possibility that he too, could be cast away. We know that we shall have to face a merciful God or else we too shall fail.

### The Spirit of Worship

Much has been said of the importance of scriptural worship. Great stress has been laid on the danger of violating the law of God by adding to the worship an element not taught in the word. Acts of worship authorized in the word do not consititute scriptural worship unless these are done in the proper manner. "God is a spirit: and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth." Jn. 4:24.

Too often overlooked is the fact that spiritual worship includes preparation to worship. Israel had to prepare themselves to meet with God. (Ex. 19:10-11). The old testament priests were to prepare themselves before they could come before the Lord. (Ex. 30: 17-21). Jesus taught the need of proper preparation before worship in Matt. 5:23-24. We may go through an exercise characteristic of one who is worshipping; but unless our heart is prepared we have not worshipped, "Let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our heart sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water". Heb. 10:22.

How do we prepare ourself for worship? We might begin by going to bed at a reasonable time on Saturday night! For many people the worship service is ruined before they ever leave home on Sunday morning. The hectic scene in the home of the average church member I offer as proof. After getting up late and the mad rush that follows, it is difficult for the flustered wife, the bewildered children and an irate husband to become tranquil worshippers upon reaching the church building.

The boisterious - often rowdy atmosphere so prevalent prior to the time for services to begin does not promote the spirit of worship. Jokes, gossip, and visiting all tend to distract and divert our mind from the purpose for which we assemble. It should be unnecessary for the song leader to have to announce the number of the first song two or three times, then start singing to the "chatter" of those who refuse to be quiet until they have finished their tale. It would improve our worship if we would try to arrive on time and use the few moments before services start in quiet thought and meditation. If you have a little time before the services start, why not read your Bible lesson. read a selection from the Psalms. or if the hymn numbers are posted, get a song book and study the words of the songs to be used.

A few words need also to be said concerning the spirit that should prevail during a worship service. Remember that Jesus has said, "For where two or three are gathered together in my name there am I in the midst of them." (Mt. 18:20). The spirit of reverence should prevail at all times. We must "serve God acceptably with reverence and Godly fear". (Heb. 12:28) The purpose of our worship is not to entertain; but to glorify God. (I Cor. 10:31). Our worship should be offered heartily, as unto God and not as unto men. (Col. 3:23; Eph. 6:6). There are often distractions that may annoy us; but if we are intent in our worship many of these small "distractions" may pass unnoticed. Let us worship God with the truth and spirit both.

But, we must state that there is no particular merit in a "confession of wrong" in and of itself. There is no magic in coming to the front of the auditorium and saying we have set a bad example and that we're sorry. We must change our attendance habits, our devotional habits and live for the Lord before we're bettered.

There are those known to most congregations who come very rarely and about half of the time they come they are "restored". I don't know what from, or what to, but they "confess ther sins". Most sins could best be confessed in private praying places.

There are many who need to be reinstated in fellowship of local saints and with God. Let's each pray for others who need to do this that they will. We might offer those a word of direction who are trying to get enough strength to be restored: Read the Bible regularly and pray. Ask God for the help you need.

- 6. We become children of God when we are baptized. (Gal. 3:26-27).
- 7. We please God in being baptized. (Mt. 3:17).
- 8. We die to sin with Christ when we are baptized. (Rom. 6:3).
- 9. By baptism one enters the church, (1 Cor. 12:13)
- 10. Baptism is a definite, inspired command. (Acts 10:48).

If a person is saved without baptism, he would be saved without all those things which, we have here mentioned. And with these facts before us, we can clearly see why Jesus said: "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, except a man is born of water and the Spirit he cannot enter into the kingdom of God."
