Many religious people in our time have the idea that the church is really not important to salvation. It is taught by millions of people that one can go to heaven and not be in the church. This is certainly not in harmony with the teaching of the Bible. To say that one can go to heaven and not be in the church is to say:

- 1. that one can go to heaven and not be saved! "For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the savior of the body." (Eph. 5:23) Jesus did not promise to be the savior of the body, the church, and also of certain others who felt they did not want to be a part of the church.
- 2. that one can go to heaven without the blood of Christ, "Husbands love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it." (Eph. 5:25) When Christ died on the cross, it was for the church. He shed His precious blood to purchase the church. "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood." (Acts 20:28) To get the benefit of that which was spent we must be a part of that which it purchased.
- 3. that one can be saved outside of Christ, hence, without Christ. "Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole. This is the stone which was set at nought of

you builders, which is become the head of the corner. Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." (Acts 4:10-12)

4. that all that's said in the Bible is unnecessary. But, God does not give needless revelation. Everything He has said is of importance and will certainly a ccomplish its purpose. We may not see the reasoning in all that God has said and done, but that is not because there is fault in Him, it is because we are so far beneath His glorious power and wisdom. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts. neither are your ways my ways, saith the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways. and my thoughts than your thoughts. For as the rain cometh down, and the snow from heaven, and returneth not thither, but watereth the earth, and maketh it bring forth and bud, that it may give seed to the sower, and bread to the eater: so shall by word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it." A Fireman Goes where the Fires Are

If Christians are determined to wage a courageous battle against Satan and his forces, it will be necessary for the two armies to meet face to face and for the power of the gospel to be used agains t every temptation of sin. There is neither honor nor victory in dodging moral issues which threat en the purity and righteousness of God's church.

A cadet from West Point i mpressed me with a thought along this vein just prior to his graduation from the Academy. He said each cadet was allowed to list several locations throughout the world where he would like to spend his four year tour of duty. My friend had requested Southeast Asia. He explained that his ambition was to become a general in the United States Army as soon as possible. As a commissioned officer he wanted to prove himself to be a capable leader and in his words, "A fireman goes where the fires are."

This is the attitude which can conquer enemies of our country, but more important, this is the same attitude which can conquer ignorance of God's word, indifferences among church members, and many other wiles of the Devil.

A problem of this nature is magnified in the church because its members fail to call their foe by its real name. Sin is no longer thought of as being sin, but rather is called by a different name and treated as an unwelcomed guest (wishing he weren't here, but always wanting to be polite about the matter). This is not the way the apostles dealt with sin. Peter's message on the day of Pentecost cut the hearts of the Jews who listened to him (Acts 2:37). And yet did he frighten or offend these people so as to keep them from accepting the gospel? On the contrary, the result of that type of preaching brought forth a response to the gospel invitation which has been unequaled by the church of our Lord in the twentieth century.

It may appear harsh to some, but the Bible speaks too plainly on certain matters for us not to be reminded of sin which is present in our own congregation. When one-fourth of the membership consistently misses the Sunday morning worship services and more than half of the membership is absent on Sunday evening, sin is among our own number for many are wilfully forsaking the assembly and rebelling to the rule which the elders have over our spiritual welfare. When immodest dress either in our social activities or at the worship services is conveniently called "style" rather than sin, the Scriptures need to be consulted again for a more perfect guide in Christian living. When Christians use their own tongue as an instrument for evil by backbiting, gossip, deceitfulness and lying, someon e needs to recognize that Satan has infiltrated our own ranks. The fire we have intended to fight has spread into our own camp.

Some years ago, while laboring with the St. Elmo church in Chattanooga, Tennessee, on several Sunday afternoons I preached to the girls in the Florence Crittend on Home. As I stood before the se girls, I knew they represented many fallen men. I knew they represented that many homes into which sorrow, shame, and heartache had come. All of them were to become unwed mothers. Most of them were in their teens. Their faces were young and sweet and tended, but deeply troubled. Many of them had run away from distant homes and parents, and for all practical purposes, they were utterly alone in the most trying hour that can ever come to a woman's soul.

After doing my best to encourage, help, and strengthen them with the words of Christ, who hates sin but whose heart is ever touched by the plight of those who fall into sin, I asked the matron, a swe e t motherly woman, "Do you ever question the girls as to what caused their downfall?" She replied, "Yes, we question them because we want to help them; and you may be surprised, but most of them say they started toward their ruin when they learned to dance." "No," replied, "I am not surprised. Everybody acquainted with the modern dance ought to be able to see that its tendency is toward the immoral and indecent."

The above quotation reveals an experience that many preachers have encountered. It doesn't take much of that to convince a preacher that he should cry out against the danger and sinfulness of dancing. The sad thing is that many will hear such, but feel, "Well, it might happen to others, but it could never happen to me or my child-" It's just like death—it always happens to somebody else—it can't happen to me!

The God of Pleasure - -

An NBC-TV documentary, narrated by Sander Vanoccur on May 8, portrayed our society's "Pursuit of Pleasure." After ranging from hedonism through nudity and LSDism, the closing question was left unanswered. Indeed, this was the disturbing premise of the production. "How much individual permissiveness can be permitted without losing that element of cohesion necessary to maintain an ordered society?" Though poised to such imposing spokesmen as the editors of "Playboy" and "National Observer" magazines, and the dean of the Harvard Divinity School.

Interesting it was, however that the attitudes and actions presented which were an obvious rejection of Biblical morality, instead reenforced the validity of Christ's standard. Twenty centuries ago inspired men wrote that men would be "lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God." (2 Tim. 3:4) LSD high priest, Timothy Leary's observation that society, weary of liquor and sex, had turned to hallucinatory drugs for a "new kick." but would in time restlessly move on to something else, also confirmed inspired teaching. Paul wrote that along with fornicators and haters of God would be those "inventors of evil things . . . ", those seeking to fulfill the restless urge of spiritual beings starving on a diet of materialism and sin (Rom. 1:29-32.)

If these Biblical observations could be made with such relevent accuracy though written 2,000 years ago, is this Book of no consequence? Is the author of these accurate predictions only a man? Indeed sin's pleasures cannot satisfy the soul, but endure only for a season. Today, as always, man needs to live"... by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God."
