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IMMORALITY IN THE CHURCH — DANCING

With immorality and licentiousness ever on the increase in our world today, living a godly, righteous life is becoming more and more difficult. Truly we need to "buffet (our) bodies, and bring (them) into bondage" (I Cor. 9:27), and "exercise (ourselves) unto godliness" (I Tim. 4:7), while at all times resisting the devil (Jas. 4:7) and approving things that are excellent (Phil. 1:10). Our youth especially are surrounded by forces that would lead them down the path to eternal destruction. We must train them while they are young (Prov. 22:6) to remember the Creator (Eccl. 12: 1). The modern dance, seemingly so harmless, is one tool the devil uses to draw young people away from the Lord. Let us set forth some principles which demonstrate that Christian youth should avoid the modern dance.

1. The modern dance is sinful because of the fruit it bears. 1 Jesus taught very plainly that a "tree" is known by its "fruit". "A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit" (Matt. 7:18). How many countless homes have been destroyed, the destruction of which began at a modern dance? How many teenage and/or unwed mothers can trace their "mistake" to the modern dance? How often do we read of killings, beatings, and such like at dance halls and related places? "A good tree cannot bring forth

evil fruit?" If the modern dance was "good", it would not produce such evil fruit. The Christian must stay away from this ungodly, unwholesome activity.

- 2. The modern dance is sinful because of the evils associated with it. No one can deny that, in most instances, alcoholic beverages are associated with the modern dance. If not actually served at the dance, they are always "close by". Many a dance has turned into an all night "bash". Also, illegal drug peddlers are known to focalize their efforts at dance gatherings. And as "evil companions corrupt good morals" (I Cor. 15:33), Christians certainly will not want to endanger themselves by needlessly being exposed to such evil influences. "Abstain from the very appearance of evil," is Paul's wise admonition (I Thess. 5:22).
- 3. The modern dance is sinful because its popularity is based on lasciviousness. Notice how Thayer defines the Greek word translated "lasciviousness". "Wanton acts or manners, as filthy words, indencent bodily movements, unchaste handling of males and females, etc." If that doesn't describe the modern dance, human words could not do it. The word "revelling" is also associated with the dance. These two activities are denounced forcefully by Paul in Galatians 5:19-21.
- 4. The modern dance is also sinful because of the influence it would have on others. Jesus said that we are the "light of the world?" Light attracts. Would we want to attract people to the modern dance? Paul said we are to be "blameless and harmless, the sons of God,

without rebuke, in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation, among whom ye shine as lights in the world" (Phil. 2:15). And the great prophet Zechariah raises us to the highest standards when he says that the people of God will so live that people of the world will want to follow us, "saying, we will go with you: for we have heard that God is with you" (Zech. 8:23). Our influence should be such as to lead people into the kingdom of God, and not make them wonder whether or not we are true Christians.

Christian people are to live a life worthy of the gospel of Christ (Phil. 1:27), glorifying God in all that we do (I Cor. 10:31, Mt. 5:16) "holding forth the word of life" (Phil. 2:16). "Keep thyself pure," is Paul's instructions to Timothy, having "no fellowship" with evil and darkness (Eph. 5:11). The dance hall is simply not conducive to growth in the Lord (II Pet. 3:18). We are to bring "every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ" (II Cor. 10:5), thinking only of things that are true, honest, just, pure, love, of good report, virtuous. and praiseworthy (Phil. 4:8). Christians should reflect the "architectural genius" of God (I Pet. 2:5-9); in other words, people should see the wisdom of God, the Master Builder, when they look at our lives. Our lives reflect back on the God we claim to serve; what kind of "building" do people see when they look at us? No, the dance hall is no place for the Christian who would "abstain from fleshly lusts" (I Pet. 2:11), and "keep oneself unspotted from the world" (Jas. 1:27).

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Wives, Win Your Husbands To Christ

"Likewise you wives, be submissive to your husbands, so that some though they do not obey the word, may be won without a word by the behavior of their wives, when they see your reverent and chaste behavior. Let not yours be the outward adorning with the braiding of hair, decoration of gold, and wearing of robes, but let it be the hidden person of the heart with the imperishable jewel of a gentle and quiet spirit, which in God's sight is very precious." (I Peter 3:1-4 RSV).

When the gospel was preached in the first century, many wives responded to its call. But in many instances, their husbands did not. Instead of obeying the truth, they became stubborn and rebellious refusing to follow the action of their wives. Their refusal was a problem in the first century. So Peter writes to inform wives how they can break down the barrier of resistance and bring their husbands to the Master.

Since wives have the same problem today, let us examine the words of the apostle Peter.

What Peter Does Not Advise

We first consider what the in-

spired apostle does not advise the wife to do.

- 1. He does not advise the wife to leave her husband. This would be sinful. No good could be accomplished by her deserting her husband. Paul was in perfect agreement when he said "And the woman which hath a husband that believeth not, and if he be pleased to dwell with her, let her not leave him." (I Cor. 7:13).
- 2. He does not advise the wife to nag her husband. He has already heard the truth and is stubbornly refusing to obey it. Her nagging, arguing, and constant preaching will only make him more rebellious, more inclined to refuse the call of the gospel.
- 3. He does not advise the wife to neglect her service to God. Wives who please their husbands by staying home on Sunday and Wednesday nights; wives who go to the "beer parties," etc. are not pleasing God and will not bring their husbands to Christ. Why should he obey the gospel? Is she living different from him? The wife who neglects her service to God will drive her husband further from the Lord.
- 4. He does not advise the wife to be overly concerned with her outward appearance. He is not saying, of course, that she should not be clean and attractive in appearance, but that she should be concerned primarily with the condition of the heart.

What Peter Does Advise

Secondly, let us consider what Peter advises the wife to do to win her husband to Christ.

1. She must be submissive to her husband. That she must be in subjection to her husband is important not only to bring her husband to Christ, but to please God. (Read Eph. 5:22-24). This subjection must be genuine. The wife must put aside her pride and her "rights" and gen-

uinely seek to serve her husband. Her husband must come secondly only to her service to God. When the wife is submissive, the wall of stubbornness sometimes cracks.

- 2. She must be reverent. She must, of course, reverence God, but in our text, Peter refers to her awe, respect for her husband.
- 3. She must be chaste and pure. Purity must reign in her thoughts, speech, and life. Without purity, she will accomplish little. She will only disgust her husband and never bring him to Christ.
- 4. She must have a gentle and quiet spirit. The "spirit" here means disposition or temper.

Her disposition then must be that of "a calm temper; a contented mind; a heart free from passion, pride, envy, and irritability; a soul not subject to the agitation and vexations of those who live for fashion, and who seek to be distinguished for external adorning." (Barnes)

Her purpose in life must be that of serving God. When her purpose is that, she will control her temper; she will not seek the things of this world; she will not desire others; she will be free from the character of the world.

We close with a comment from Clement of Alexandria: "The wise woman, then will first choose to persuade her husband to be her associate in what is conducive to happiness. And should that be found impractical, let her by herself earnestly aim at virtue, gaining her husband's consent in everything, so as never to do anything against his will, with the exception of what is reckoned as contributing to virtue and salvation."

IS BAPTISM A "MUST"?

Saul of Tarsus, a violent persecutor of the church, was on his way
