Was the Thief on the Cross Saved?

The account of the thief dying on the cross is one of great interest. In our study of the thief we want to consider two things. First, was he baptized? Secondly, is he an example for us today? I will not give you my opinion on this matter, for we all have opinions and your opinion is as good as mine. I am sure that human thoughts and opinions are responsible for so many honest souls going contrary to heaven's will. Since this is a Biblical subject we should be willing to let God's word answer these questions and gladly accept what God has to say.

1. The account of the thief dying with Christ was a matter of prophecy. Isaiah announced that He would be numbered with the transgressors" (Isa. 53:12). We read. "And there were also two other, malefactors, let with him to be put to death. And when they were come to the place, which is called Calvary, there they crucified him, and the malefactors, one on the right hand, and the other on the left. The said Jesus, Father forgive them; for they know not what they do. And they parted his rainment, and cast lots. And the people stood beholding. And the rulers also with them derided him, saying, He saved others; let him save himself, if he be Christ, the chosen of God. And the soldiers also mocked him, coming to him, and offering him vinegar, and saying, If thou be the king of the Jews, save thyself. And a superscription also was written over him in letters of Greek, and Latin, and Hebrew, THIS IS THE KING OF THE JEWS, And one of the malefactors which were hanged railed on him, saying, If thou be Christ, save thyself and us. But the other answering rebuked him, saying, Dost not thou fear God, seeing thou art in the same condemnation? And we indeed justly; for we receive the due reward of our deeds: but this man hath done nothing amiss. And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, Today shalt thou be with me in paradise" (Luke 23:32-43). It is understood that the thief will be saved, for Jesus

said, "today shalt thou be with me in paradise." Many feel that since Jesus made this statement to the thief and said nothing about baptism that the thief was not baptized, therefore, no one must be baptized to be saved.

Was the thief baptized? To those who feel that the thief was not baptized I ask, how do you know he was not baptized? Where is the passage(s) of scripture(s) that teach he was not baptized? Do you think that because he was a thief he wasn't baptized? Sometimes we assume too much and in this case you are assuming absolutely too much if you feel that the thief wasn't baptized. The truth is no one can prove that the thief was not baptized. It is probable that the thief was baptized. We read, "and the same John had his raiment of camel's hair, and a leathern girdle about his loins; and his meat was locusts and wild honey. Then went out to him Jerusalem, and all Judea and all the region round about Jordan, and were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins" (Matthew 3:3-6). The thief lived where John did his word - baptizing hundreds. No one can prove that the thief was not among this great host.

2. Is the thief an example for us to-day? Do you realize that the thief lived under the Old Testament law? No one can be saved like the thief today, for he lived under the old covenant, and we are living under the new covenant, which became effective after the death of Christ. Christ hadn't died at the time of the thief, and the New Testament did not become effective until he did die (Hebrews 9:15-17). The thief was not subject to the same law that we are. We live in New Testament times and if we are saved at all we MUST comply with the conditions of salvation set forth in the New Will.

There is no way around it. You must come out from behind the thief and obey the Lord. Hear Christ, "and Jesus came and spake unto them saying, All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go

ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world" (Matthew 28:18-20). Can you be saved without being baptized? Jesus said NO. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, but he that believeth not shall be damned" (Mark 16:16).

We read of Paul's conversion, "and now, why tarriest thou? Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16). Your sins are washed away when you obey the Lord.

Will you give up excuses, and stop trying to go around the word of the Lord? The Savior is interested in you, He desires that all would be saved (2 Peter 3:9).

Things That Miracles Have Never Done

1. Conversion to Christ has never been done by a miracle. Jesus said a man had to be born of water and the Spirit (John 3:5). This the Lord interpreted when he told the apostles to preach the gospel to every creature, and he that believeth and is baptized shall be saved. (Mk. 16:15,16). The Holy Spirit's part in the new birth was through the word he revealed. Man's part is to receive that word and act upon it. When this is done there is created in us a new heart by the change

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of understanding, the change of the emotions, and the change of the will. Check up on the conversions in the book of Acts and you will find that this was always the case in every conversion. Miracles were done to show the authenticity of the word of God but the conversion came about when men believed that word, repented of their sins, and were baptized into Christ.

- 2. No man was qualified to preach the gospel as the result of a miracle. To preach the gospel one had to first be a Christian, then be faithful to the Lord, and prepare himself to carry this gospel to others. Timothy is a good example of this. He was Paul's own son in the faith (I Timothy 1:2). He had been taught the gospel by the apostle. He also was a faithful Christian in the congregation for a period of time before Paul took him on his missionary tours. He was "a certain disciple" of Lystra and Derbe, "Which was well reported of by the brethren that were at Lystra and Iconium." (Acts 16: 1,2). He was a sincere believer as can be seen in 2 Timothy 1:5. He was also well versed in the Old Testament scriptures because Paul declared him to have known the holy scriptures from a child. (2 Tim. 3:15). Paul then circumcised him and took him with him in his work (Acts 16:3). When Timothy was left at Ephesus Paul instructed him as to encouraging others to preach the gospel. He said, "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also." (2 Timothy 2:2).
- 3. No man was ever qualified to be an elder of the church by a miracle. A great deal of effort and preparation is necessary on the part of a Christian man to be qualified for the eldership. "A

bishop then must be blameless, the husband of one wife, vigilant, sober, of good behaviour, given to hospitality, apt to teach; Not given to wine, no striker, not greedy of filthy lucre; but patient, not a brawler, not covetous; One that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity; (For if a man know not how to rule his own house. how shall he take care of the church of God?) Not a novice, lest being lifted up with pride he fall into the condemnation of the devil. Moreover he must have a good report of them which are without; lest he fall into reproach and snare of the devil." (I Tim. 3:2-7). It is said in Acts 20:28 that the Holy Ghost made those men overseers of the church, but the way He did this is by instructing them in qualifying themselves and in their duties of oversight.

4. No man was ever made to be faithful to the Lord by a miracle. No man spoke with more tongues, nor prophesied more, nor did more miracles than the Apostle Paul, but he still had to be faithful to Christ by individual effort. He said, "Know ye not that they which run in a race run all, but one receiveth the prize? So run, that ye may obtain. And every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible. I therefore so run, not as uncertainly; so fight I, not as one that beateth the air: But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway." (I Cor. 9: 24-27). He had to personally practice the principles he taught by inspiration in order to be saved. Everyone of us must set our affections on things above, put off sinful practices, put on good practices, and be faithful as Christians or we will not reach heaven. (Col. 3:1 - 17).

To some people words such as obedience, laws, rules, etc., are expressions which they really wish were not spoken or mentioned in any form. The reason for this attitude is mainly because they do not desire to change or conform their lives to any type of obedience.

However, one should realize that it is only by being obedient unto Jesus Christ that one will ever see God in all of His glory.

Jesus was obedient, "Through he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered: And being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him" (Heb. 5:8,9). It was because of His obedience that He was made perfect and became the author of ETERNAL salvation unto all them that OBEY Him. According to Peter Christ was our example, I Peter 2:21. Demas is a good example of this, "For Demas hath forsaken me, having loved this present world, . . ." (II Tim. 4:10a). All of the good which Demas had done in the past, was now in vain. He had a good start but a very bad end. And the same is true with people today if they do not endure and be obedient unto the end then Christ cannot be the author of their eternal salvation. Jesus said, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 7:21).

Remember, it is only through obedience that one shall ever see God in all of His glory.

Developing Churches and Leaders

Far too many congregations are struggling, "underdeveloped" due to a lack of proper scriptural leadership. Right at this very moment I can name churches in various places that have been in this sad condition for years, and in some places the condition traces clear back to the beginning of the congregation.

Some of you will appreciate this illustration for you have witnessed just such a spectable. Others may think it overdrawn but it is not.

Envision a congregation where, for the most part, the members are apathetic and uncommitted to the Lord's work. It is nearly impossible to generate enthusiasm among them. Sunday's come and go. Their claim to fame is to meet long enough on Sunday morning to eat the "cracker." The rest of the service isn't really all that important! Sunday and Wednesday evening services are unimportant.

In said congregation a very minimal number (usually one individual) share the work load. Perhaps the preacher, or another individual, is expected to "do - it - all." If he doesn't do it -- it's left undone! But if he does it he's "running - the - church."

He may be expected to make all of the decisions, prepare and serve communion, lead singing, lead the prayers, preach, teach Bible class, be the treasurer, make announcements, set the thermostat, lock and unlock the church building, mow the grass, visit the ill, and whatever else needs attending to. How has all of this come about? In my judgment such churches have not and are not developing after the New Testament order. What can be done?

I certainly do not have all the answers but here's a suggestion. TEACH INDI—VIDUAL RESPONSIBILITY. One of the greatest responsibilities teachers and preachers have is to teach members to shoulder their individual responsibility in the local church. Jesus expects each local congregation to grow and to develop properly. This can only be accomplished "if" and "when" the members decide to grow into the likeness of Christ -- accepting their obligations and responsibilities as Christians.

A considerable portion of the New Testament deals with Christian growth and development. When Christians grow and develop as they should, congregations will function as they should. And, too, part of a congregation's growth and development involves producing scripturally qualified leaders.

Something is sorely lacking in congregations that have been in existence for years but have never developed to the point of producing elders. God wants elders in every church (Acts 14:23), not some man-made arrangement.

In the New Testament the Holy Spirit revealed the divine plan for church leaders; yet, it is often ignored, tampered with, modified, or legislated upon. Each congregation is to have A PLURALITY OF QUALIFIED ELDERS TO LEAD THE FLOCK. "Elders in every church" (Acts 14:23). "Ordain elders in every city" (Titus 1:5). "Elders of the church" (Acts 20:17). "Elders of the church" (James 5:14). "At Philippi, with the bishops and deacons" (Philippians 1:1).

What is a congregation to do that does not have elders? How are decisions reached? To say the least, this is not a good situation to be in. Exercise great caution. Even in congregations, without elders, the Lord's work must be carried on by his people.

Congregations, without elders, must function through some avenue to make decisions (such as a general "business meeting"). In such an arrangement faithful men will come together to plan the Lord's work. All decisions must be made according to Christ's will and not men's.

Do not become too fond of, or fall in love with, the general business meeting arrangement — it is a substitute! God wants elders in every church overseeing the work (Acts 14:23; 20:28). Sometimes brethren like the "business meeting" arrangement and see no need for elders. This is a mistake.

Let us all take on cheerfully the obligations we have as Christians -- let's all do our part. Let's all be committed to the concept of growing and developing into mature Christians. When this occurs the problems created by not having qualified leaders will be greatly reduced.

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SIMPLICITY VS.

CONFUSION

In religion we have an amazing contrast between God's simplicity and man's confusion. God's way is so simple. It is man who has complicated things. Let's look at God's simple plan for all mankind:

I. ONE WORLD - ONE SAVIOR

We cannot come to the Father by anyone else (John 14:6). He is the world's only mediator (I Tim. 2:5). God is no respector of persons. He has given this world just one Savior. That's all there is; that's all we need.

II. ONE WORLD - ONE PLAN OF SALVATION

If saved at all we are all saved the same way. We must all believe in Christ (Mark 16:16). All must repent (Acts 17: 30), confess (Matt. 10:32) and be baptized (Matt. 28:19). All the saved must remain faithful to the Lord (Rev. 2:10). This is the only plan of salvation there is.

III. ONE WORLD - ONE CHURCH

God planned (Eph. 3:10,11) and Jesus built one church (Matt. 16:18). It was bought with Christ's blood (Acts 20: 28). All the saved are added to it (Acts 2: 47). For all the world God provided just ONE church.

IV. ONE WORLD - ONE BOOK

To guide the saved God gave one book, the Bible. It's the only book He has ever given to man. It is sufficient (2 Tim. 3:16, 17). The whole world will be judged by it (Rev. 20:11 - 15).

V. ONE WORLD - ONE GLORIOUS HOPE

The faithful saints have the blessed hope of heaven. They are truly headed for the same place. If they accept the one savior, obey the one plan of salvation, worship and serve God in the one church, follow the teachings of the one book, they will live together eternally in heaven.

Man has added confusion to that which is so simple. Can't you see how much better God's way is? We plead with you to return with us to the simplicity of God's one way for all the world.
