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Some Incentives to Contend for the Faith

We should contend for the faith because we love the souls of men. We learn from Acts 17:16 that Paul's spirit was provoked within Him because he loved the truth and the souls of men. The results of his defense are well known. The great difficulty in getting men to defend the faith today is the fact that men's spirits, generally, do not burn within them when they see men lost and practicing things that will not save.

Paul knew something that they did not know, and that was the knowledge of God, Christ, and the church. So no matter where Paul might find himself and regardless of what the circumstances might be, he was ready to dispute if it meant the salvation of souls.

"So he reasoned in the synagogue with the Jews and the devout persons, and in the marketplace every day with them that met him." (Acts 17:17)
"Then after the space of fourteen

years I went up again to Jerusalem with Barnabas, taking Titus also with me. And I went up by revelations; and I laid before them the gospel which I preach among the Gentiles but privately before them who were of repute, lest by any means I should be running, or had run, in vain. But not even Titus who was with me, being a Greek, was compelled to be circumcised: and that because of the false brethren privily brought in, who came in privily to spy out our liberty which we have in Jesus Christ, that they might bring us into bondage: to whom we gave place in the way of subjection, no, not for an hour; that the truth of the gospel might continue with you." (Galatians) 2:1-5)

The man that defends the faith must be courageous enough to be willing to speak out for the defense of sound doctrine regardless of the consequences.

We should contend for the faith because if we do not then nobody will. The church is the pillar and support of the truth.

"But if I tarry long, that thou mayest know how men ought to behave themselves in the house of God, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and ground of the truth." (I Tim. 3:15)

Denominational preachers do not and will not preach the full truth; and if they

did they would destroy the very denominations which support them. No denominational preacher exalts the church of Jesus Christ above denominational churches. What denominational preacher could be expected to show that his man-made church is in open conflict with the church of our Lord? However, it is a fact beyond dispute that the church of our Lord is just as far above all churches that have been built by men as the Lord himself is above men or as divinity is above humanity.

In Acts 4:15 Peter and John were commanded to stop preaching the truth. If they had stopped preaching the truth, they would have stopped making Christians; for men become Christians as the result of the truth's being preached, received and obeyed.

"Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and the rest of the apostles, Brethren, what shall we do? And Peter said unto them, Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ unto the remission of your sins; and he shall recieve the gift of the Holy Spirit. For to you is the promise, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call unto him. And with many other words he testified and exhorted them, saying, Save yourselves from this crooked generation. They then that received his word were baptized: and there were added unto them in that day about three thousand souls. And they continued stedfastly in the apostle's teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread and the prayers.

"And fear came upon every soul: and many wonders and signs were done through the apostles. And all that believed were together and had all things common; and they sold their possession and goods, and parted them to all, according as any man had need. And day by day, continuing stedfastly with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread at home, they took their food with gladness and singleness of heart, praising God, and having favor with all the people.

He Must Needs Pass Through Samaria

Early in the ministry of Jesus, after He had been baptized in Judea, He decided to leave Judea and go into Galilee. "And he must pass through Samaria." Read John 4:19-24.

When Jesus reached Jacob's well, He sat down to rest. His disciples went into the city to buy food. Presently, a woman of Samaria came to the well to draw water. Jesus soon engaged her in conversation.

It did not take long for the woman to realize there was something unusual about this stranger. He showed her that He had a knowledge of her affairs, and she decided He was a prophet. She also knew that He was of the nation of the Jews, and supposed He would contend that Jerusalem was the God-appointed place to worship.

"OUR FATHERS..."

"Our fathers worshipped in this mountain," said the woman of Samaria. She referred to Mount Gerizim, on which the Samaritans had built their temple. They built up a lot of traditions around that mount—traditions that made it seem to them a very sacred place. Someone has said that Gerizim is still to the Samaritans what Jerusalem is to the Jews, and Mecca to the Mohammedans.

The woman must have thought it mattered not if a prophet did say that in Jerusalem was the place where men should worship. Samaritans had their own ideas—their own traditions. The woman was not far enough along at that point to say, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?"

"WORSHIP IN SPIRIT AND IN TRUTH. . ."

The Samaritan accepted only the five books of Moses. In giving laws during the encampment at Mount Sinai, God said, "In every place where I record my name I will come unto thee and I will bless thee" (Exo. 20-24). As nothing was said in the five books of Moses about Jerusalem as the place to worship, and as Jerusalem did not become the permanent place to worship until David's reign, the Samaritans did not consider that a divine arrangement.

Rejecting the testimony of the prophet Daivd, as well as the other prophets, they were really not worshipping God, though they thought they were. Hence, Jesus said, "Ye worship that which ye know not." When Jesus said the hour was coming when

they would worship niether in Jerusalem not in Mount Gerizim He did not mean that God could not be worshipped in those places. He meant it would not be necessary to go to either place to worship.

"TRUE WORSHIPPERS . . . "

True worshippers in spirit and truth; the Father seeks that kind of worshippers. As there are true worshippers, there is also true worship. The Atheniens worshipped God ignorantly; that was not true worship. If a man's religion was vain, so would his worship be (Jas. 1:26). Jesus quoted from Isaiah: "In vain do they worship me teaching as their doctrines the precepts of men" (Matt. 15:9). Paul spoke of will-worship (Col. 2:23). Will-worship is self-directed worship. True worship comes from the heart, and is conducted according to the truth. Paul expressed a similar thought when he said, "For God is my witness, whom I serve in my spirit in the gospel of his Son" (Rom. 1:9). Joshua exhorted Israel: "Now therefore fear Jehovah and serve him in sincerity and truth" (Joshua 24:14).

Worship and service must therefore have these two characteristics: It must be performed in sincerity and in harmony with the truth.

"IN SPIRIT ..."

There is danger that all worship degenerate into a mere formality. Worship that does not come from the heart is more flattery.

"But they flatter him with their mouth, and lied unto him with their tongue. For their heart was not right with him, neither were they faithful in his covenant" (Psa. 78:36, 37). David was speaking of God's own people.

Ezekiel was a prophet, and the people pretended to go to him to hear the word of God. God said of them: "And they come unto thee as the people cometh, and they sit before thee as my people, and they hear thy words, but so them not; for with their mouth they show much love, but their heart goeth after their gain" (Ezek. 33:31). Jesus called such people hypocrites. "Ye hypocrites, well did Isaiah prophesy of you, saying, This people honoreth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me" (Matt. 15:7-8). Sincere devotion to God must be manifested in obedience to truth of God. The sincerely devoted person wants to do what God says; if he does not want to do what God says, he is not sincere in his pretended service or worship.

In the foregoing quotation from Psalm 78, David connects sincerity with faithfulness in God's covenant. God said to Ezekiel: Her priests have done violence to my law, and have profaned my holy things. They have made no distinction between the holy and the common, neither have they caused men to discern between the unclean and the clean."

The holy and the clean were things God had set apart for His service and worship. The common and the unclean were things they introduced. Bringing their own inventions into God's worship and service, thus mixing human inventions with divine requirements, was doing violence to God's law, and making no distinction between their own inventions and the laws of God. They were profaning God, bringing Him down on a level with them, in making their own inventions equal to His commands.

True education is a gradual process, like the sunrise-not a sudden one, like lightning.

A person who doubts himself is like a man who would enlist in the ranks of his enemies and bear arms against himself. He makes the failure certain by himself being the first person to be convinced of it.

Abranam Lincoln said: "I like to see a man proud of the place in which he lives; and I like to see a man live so that his place will be proud of him. Now change that a little. I like to see a man proud of the church where he lives; and I like to see a man live so the congregation will be proud of him.

How is it with you? Are you proud of this congregation? Are you striving to make it something of which we can be proud? Are you proud of its accomplishments? Its attendance? Its giving? Its attitude? Its love and concern for one another? Then, too, are you the type of member that the congregation can be truly proud of? Are you making a real, genuine effort to be worth something to the Cause of Christ at this place? REMEMBER, WE CAN BE VALUABLE OR VALUELESS!!
